Just in are agreements from both Aloha and Hawaiian Airlines to send some money to sponsor our 12th annual convention in Maui, Hawaii. This will help defray some of our convention costs, however at this time it is not known how much it will change the registration fee.

JOURNEY TO LAHAINA

Busses have been chartered to take us to the quaint town of Lahaina where we will be attending the most authentic luau on the islands (or so I've been told!). The busses will pick us up at 1530 from the Embassy Suites on Wednesday to take us for the 30 minute drive to Lahaina. This will give us about an hour and a half browsing and shopping prior to sitting down to our Hawaiian feast. VARIOUS SUITES AVAILABLE

Several questions have been received concerning the type of suites available to us at the Embassy Suites. There are two types of configurations in the bedrooms. The King suite has one king-sized bed in the bedroom. The Double suite has two double beds in the bedroom. Both types of suites have a sofa that opens into a queen-sized bed in the living room.

HAWAIIAN AIRLINES PASS CONFUSION

It seems we were not specific enough about the information required by Hawaiian airlines to obtain the special inter-island passes, as several of our members have experienced difficulties with their requests. Please follow the directions below - if you have already written to Hawaiian without including all these items, you may have to resubmit your request. We apologize for any inconvenience this may have caused you.

- 1. The request is only good for inter-island travel. Passes are not available from the west coast to Hawaii.
- 2. The request is only valid for yourself, your dependants, and spouse. It is not valid for parents, friends or other relatives.
- 3. Submit a letter indicating your name and the names of any dependants or spouse travelling with you and indicate that you will be attending the International Society of Women Airline Pilots Convention.
- 4. State your route of travel. Each segment is \$10 and you must include the correct amount by check. A cashier's check is preferable but a personal check will be accepted.
- 5. Submit all of this along with a self-addressed, stamped, business-sized envelope.

ISLAND ADVENTURES


The Ocean Activities Centre will be sending each of you a package with info about the various island activities that are available, so that you can be thinking about your plans for Thursday and the rest of your Hawaiian vacation.

CAR RENTAL

To those of you who will be arriving at the West Maui airport: if you reserved a car with the Trans Maui Car Rental through the form in your ISA registration package, you will pick up your car at the Budget Car Rental location (Trans Maui's only location is at the main Maui airport). In order to accommodate you at the west end, they have arranged cars for you through Budget at the same low rate.

ARRIVING IN HONOLULU

If you are arriving in Honolulu, you will need to allow at least one hour to make any inter-island connections. The Honolulu airport is undergoing major renovations, which may cause some confusion. Below is a diagram of the airport layout to help you find your way. The Wiki Wiki bus, which runs between the main terminal and the inter-island terminal, is slow, so don't plan on making any tight connections.

OUR WOMEN AIRLINE PILOTS IN INDIA

Indian Airlines has 6 women pilots, and they report many differences in their flying that we thought you might find interesting.

- 1. To qualify for a position with Indian Airlines you must be of Indian nationality and residence, no more than 30 years of age and have a high school or 10th class academic education. You must be a CPL holder, be a current FRTO, have a current COP certificate and have passed a Morse Code test!
- 2. Working conditions are the same for women as they are for men. The uniform is the same for females as that worn by males: shirt with flap pockets, trousers, epaulettes on shoulders, neckties and caps. Nivedita Bhasin just became Indian Airlines first pilot/mother, so management and the chief medical officer had to design a company maternity policy.
- 3. All flights are operated in non-radar environment, except within a 50

NM radius of a few of the major airports, such as Bombay, Calcutta, Delhi and Madras.

4. More than 30% of the airports where they operate the B737 do not have landing aids such as VOR/VASI/DME/Approach lighting systems. Many of the runways are less than 6,000 feet long and NDBs the only approaches.

Their union, the Indian Commercial Pilots' Association, issued a directive beginning December 1, 1988 to their members to cease B737 operation into these fields until management had taken steps to improve and install required aids and systems. Considering the expense of the undertaking and lack of funds, management has promised to make the improvements within a given time frame, so service has been restored to many of the airports.

- 5. The communications network is very poor and obtaining weather for various stations is difficult. In bad weather, long delays and disruption of schedules are experienced.
- 6. The system of "pass riding" or "deadheading" does not exist. Employees are given 5 tickets per year for use by self and family for travel within India. Passes for international travel are given once every other year. Beyond this, 100% fare is applicable.
- 7. Salaries are comparably less than other airlines. Pay is based on actual flying done in the month. Just attending an ISA convention outside India would cost approximately one months' salary!
- 8. Despite these vast differences, these

women love flying and are pioneers in their own land. We'd like to introduce them to you:

CORRESPONDENCE

Thanks to Jean Harper for sending in a copy of the "Par Avion" company's brochure of aviation wear and accessories (such as flight suit-inspired jumpsuits, aviation-inspired dresses, and propellor broaches!). I understand that many of our members in the U.S. have received this brochure in the mail, but for those of you who haven't and would be interested in getting one, the company's address as advertised on the brochure is 820 Coventry Road, Kingston, CA 94707. From the

brochure, it appears that this company has developed some really great-looking products with a unique appeal to women pilots. For added interest, throughout the brochure they include brief historical clips about women pilots such as Beryl Markham, Harriet Quimby and Amelia Earhart.

ISA has received a letter from Assistant Professor Gayle J. Vail at Indiana State University's Department of Aerospace Technology, telling us about a 20 year longitudinal study that has been done on Gender Differences in Pilot-Error accidents. The professor states that the study indicates "..women in aviation are having an impact on pilot safety records - a beneficial one." We have written to the professor asking for details of the study results and will publish them when we receive them.

LAST MINUTES ED'S NOTES

I had the pleasure last week of deadheading on a Wardair (Canada) flight with Wardair's first (and only) woman pilot flying as first officer. Barbara Green was hired by the company on November 30, 1988 and has been flying the line as an Airbus 310 first officer since early February, 1989. After visiting on the flight deck for awhile I realized this was the first time I had ever been on a flight deck with a woman pilot operating, other than myself! (I loved it, of course). Wardair has recently been purchased by PWA Corp., the owner of Canadian Airlines International, though the purchase is still subject to government approval. Wardair operates two B7475, two A300s, and twelve A310s on domestic and

international routes. PWA Corp has announced that it plans to continue to operate the two airlines separately.

Ginger Mitchell reports that while it has ceased for now, it is quite likely that we will be renewing our arrangement with a California wine company to have the company make a contribution to ISA's scholarship fund whenever an ISA member purchases product from them. Look for news of this at the convention or in the next ISA newsletter, July 1, 1989.
