WOMEN AIRLINE PILOT NEEDED FOR MICHIGAN DISPLAY

The Greater Detroit Area Chapter of the Ninety-Nines is creating a new "Women in Aviation" room at the Yankee Air Force Museum at Willow Run Airport in Belleville, Michigan. The room is a 360 degree chronological representation of women's aviation history and ISA's exhibit committee is assisting them with women airline pilot history.

There is a section of the room reserved for us where they will display pictures and written history of some of our women and ISA itself. They have also requested a uniform to be displayed of one of our women airline pilots and I am suggesting that it be from someone in our membership who is from the area. Japan's Air and Maritime Self-Defense Forces have decided to open pilot jobs to women. Female pilots would be allowed to fly transports, liaison, rescue and other non-combat aircraft. The services expect a considerable number of women to apply for the slots this year. There are no signs, however, that the Defense Agency will after the regulation prohibiting women from combat assignments. IFALPA Report by Pam Stephens

As the 1993 ISA Delegate to the 48th IFALPA Conference (Int'l Federation of Air Line Pilots Associations), I would like to let you know some of the information I learned at this year's conference. In addition to the info I gave you on the videotape at our Atlanta convention (I really missed being there, but my recent seniority deterioration has me pretty much going to the leftover places at leftover times! I think I was in Hong Kong!) here are some of the other things discussed at the conference:

One of the more interesting seminars was the Global Navigation report. To clarify, right now the U.S. and Russia have the satellite networks, and the U.S. version is referred to as GPS, while the Russian one is GLONASS. The systems currently have the capability of horizontal accuracy for aircraft of less than 100 meters, a time accuracy of 1/millionth of a second, and can give you a non-precision approach down to 200'. The use of the system is not limited by technology- that is already here- but simply by the users' capability to gear up for the technology.

Goals in progress right now are GNSS (the acronym for the entire worldwide system) used for precision approaches by 1994; GNSS the sole means of navigation in the U.S. and adjacent oceanic areas by 1995; RVR300 takeoffs and landings with GNSS by 1997, and getting rid of all VOR/navaid facilities in the U.S. by the year 2000. The important issues being discussed now include ownership, operation and control responsibilities, equipment standards, and ATC policies. Additionally, of great concern is the security of the system from terrorist activity, political

standards, and ATC policies. Additionally, of great concern is the security of the system from terrorist activity, political control, etc. Currently the DOD controls and limits the signal parameters and availability. It was noted that at the present time, a signal with only a single watt of strength can effectively jam the entire system from 20K away!

I promised details from the lighter side of the conference and here they are: The Canadian Pilots Assoc. (CALPA) is sponsoring the 19th Annual IFALPA Ski Week in Lake Louise from Jan. 30 to Feb. 6, 1994. The price is about \$930 and includes 7 nights lodging at the Chateau Lake Louise and 6 days skiing, partying, meals, entertainment, and a children's program. I am working hard at following up on all the great info I got from various pilots from airlines which have recently hired women. Hopefully, we'll get some new members, and at the very least, update our statistics. Surprisingly, Air Tanzania (!) has a female 737 pilot and an F27 pilot, South African Airlines has 4, Dragonair has a female 727 pilot, Cathay swears they'll never have any! Which brings me to my second reason for writing!

Those of you at our convention heard my pitch for a 1995 convention in Asia, Bangkok specifically. The reason I feel so strongly about this is that women are very scarce among Asian airlines! Although much of this is cultural, look at the results we had with our Rome convention! I dare say Alitalia might still have an all-male flight deck without the publicity our convention earned! Look at the potential we have for stirring up Asia, gals!

Seriously, since Vancouver is so easy to get to, I propose we let that count as a "domestic" convention, and go to Bangkok in 1995. Most of the U.S. carriers fly to Bangkok, as well as almost all of the European airlines, so the majority

of us could get there on our own carriers. For those who can't, Bill Heinecke has promised to arrange for some sort of pass on Thai Airways. The trip over takes two calendar days, since you cross the dateline, of course, but the trip back is in one day, arriving almost before you depart! (Don't ask me to explain that- I've been flying the Pacific for 8 years now and I still cringe at that question!) It is comparable to our earlier Sydney convention in travel time, and the excitement of Asia awaits when you arrive! Bangkok is truly a city to be pampered in, for very little "green". You can have a massage to ease the jet lag for less than \$10, and a full "day of beauty" for about \$25.

Bill has offered us a rate of approx. \$70-80 a room in his brand new luxury hotel on the Chao Praya river, across from the famous Oriental. He owns a chain on hotels in Thailand and his wife leads tours through Cambodia, Myanmar (Burma), and Vietnam, so our side trips could be

incredible! He has resort hotels in Phuket, Chiang Mai Hua Hin. The hotel in Bangkok has its own yacht, which he has offered for a cocktail party. He is very excited about the possibility of hosting us, as he is a pilot as well as a multimillionaire, and has agreed to arrange a press conference with as much media from all over Asia as possible, and he has offered to arrange an audience with the King and Queen for us?

We have never had a convention in Asia and this would be a perfect opportunity, since Mr. Heinecke is so eager to sponsor us. If we could decide on this early enough, we could bid vacations for a few extra days off and have a truly memorable vacation as well as a (tax-deductible) convention in exotic Thailand! The people are, I believe, the warmest and friendliest in Asia, the food is good (and Cheap) the temples, palaces, and scenery breathtaking, and the climate is warm in May. And-we have the opportunity perhaps, to



AT LARGE ON THE PLANET, ARMED WITH A BOOK!


I was in an armed robbery when I was 17 years old, on January 2, 1974 at a Kroger Grocery in Columbus, Ohio. I was a cashier and two armed men rushed in and demanded money from the registers and the safe. I had a gun to my head for 8 minutes, seemed like a lifetime! When they went to make their escape they thought they were going to take me with them. They started backing me towards the door, when I lurched forward, fell to my knees, and slid my head under the bag packing platform. Two weeks earlier, two miles down the road, at another grocery store a cashier was abducted, they threw her in a trunk, (Ohio in December...pretty cold), beat, raped, shot her, then threw her in the reservoir where she drowned. I had made a plan that if anything like this ever happened to me, I would rather be shot where everyone could see, and medical help was only a phone call away. Just like in the jet, you better have practiced your emergency procedures, and have a well rehearsed plan, because a critical situation is no time to be "free lancing!" If you can't remember anything, remember this, "NEVER LEAVE A PUBLIC AREA WITH AN ABDUCTOR!"

I was jumpseating from ANC-SEA on United when S/O Lainey Richardson handed me a book, <u>DEFENSIVE LIVING</u> by Bo Hardy. He has spent many years in the law enforcement industry and knows what he is talking about. He has his own business traveling and teaching seminars on safety. This book is well worth reading and every man, woman, and child would benefit from his advice.

I will leave you with Bo's top ten tips, learn them and practice them, they don't cost a thing.

- 1. DO NOT THINK AND LOOK LIKE A VICTIM
- 2. ALWAYS LOCK THE DOORS IN YOUR CAR OR HOME IMMEDIATELY AFTER ENTERING OR EXITING. Remember your car or home can be a barrier or a trap depending on you intelligently using them to protect you.
- 3. ALWAYS USE THE BUDDY SYSTEM. Learn to always have other people around you. Using others can greatly reduce your chances of being victimized-there is strength in numbers.
- 4. TAKE 15 TO 30 SECONDS TO OBSERVE YOUR DESTINATION AREA BEFORE APPROACHING.
- 5. DO NOT PHYSICALLY RESIST AN ASSAILANT, EXCEPT TO AVOID INJURY OR DEATH.
- 6. If YOU ARE GOING TO CARRY A WEAPON,. KNOW HOW TO USE IT AND HAVE IT AVAILABLE. You can get some very effective weapons such as pepper sprays for self protection, your best weapon is your intelligence.
- 7. DETERMINE SAFE LOCATIONS AVAILABLE, should you be followed by a potential assailant while walking or driving, you'll know which way you are going to go.
- 8. BECOME AWARE OF CRIME TRENDS AND CRIMINAL CHARACTERISTICS, know the enemy and know yourself and you greatly increase your chances of survival.
- 9. NEVER LEAVE A PUBLIC AREA WITH AN ABDUCTOR. Just faint or play dead, that's what you must do! Once you are out of the public eye, you are at your assailant's mercy.
- 10. USE POSITIVE MENTAL SURVIVAL TRAINING. Role play successful solutions, (think of it as the simulator for survival) which can greatly reduce your chances of becoming a crime victim.

Every parent should read the advice on making sure your children will not go with a stranger for any reason. Be careful all the time, EVERYWHERE!
