Critical Incident Stress Management Preparing for the Aftermath

An aircraft rolls upside and slams into the ground on downwind...Landing at Dallas an aircraft touches down short of the runway then manages to successfully go around...Taking off from Phoenix, an aircraft hits and kills a man on the runway...Cruising in clear air, an aircraft hits turbulence and a flight attendant is seriously injured.

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ijackings, passenger medical emergencies, system malfunctions: as professional pilots, our jobs place us in a high risk category. We must perform routine duties with a constant awareness that routine could turn to crisis in a split second. What is often forgotten is that stress reactions as a result of trauma are normal.

In fact, the definition given for critical incident stress by Jeffrey Mitchell, Ph.D., professor at the University of Maryland and co-founder of the International Critical Incident Stress Foundation (ICISF) is that stress reactions are "a normal reaction of a normal person to an abnormal situation." However, post-traumatic stress disorder is a more serious psychiatric diagnosis.

ALPA Established CIRP

In 1994, the Air Line Pilots Association Executive Board established the Critical Incident Response Program (CIRP) to educate members about critical incident stress, and to help prevent the onset of Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) among crewmembers following a critical incident or accident. The program is composed of two parts: to educate pilots on what is critical incident stress; and to provide an avenue for pilots to resolve a stress reaction.

Critical Incident Defined

A critical incident has been defined as: (1) an aircraft accident; (2) an aircraft incident that results in injury to a crewmember or passenger; (3) an aircraft incident that results in damage to equipment; (4) an on-the-job incident where there exists the real or perceived threat of death or serious injury to a crewmember or passenger; and the most recently addition to this list, (5) an aircraft evacuation.

HIGHLIGHTS—ISA BOARD OF DIRECTORS QUARTERLY MEETING MINUTES

The quarterly Board of Directors meeting was held August 23, 1995 at the home of Binka Bone in Newnan, Georgia The meeting was called to order at 0945 EDT Board members in attendance were Chairwoman Betsy Landon, Binka Bone. Kathleen Malone, Pam Mitchell, Nancy Novaes, Carolyn Pasqualino, Morgen Greschel Reeb. Denise Van Grunsven, and Aviatrix Scholarship Trustee Charlene Sammis.

Committee Reports

- 1. The minutes of the previous board meeting were approved and correspondence was reviewed.
- 2. The income and expenses derived from the Bangkok convention were reported and the options available for diversifying the moneys in the Aviatrix Scholarship Trust Fund were discussed. The board voted to limit the use of the credit card option in fee collection to international members due to the high costs and labor
- 3. Critique sheets from the Bangkok convention were reviewed, and preliminary plans for the 1996 convention in the Dallas area were discussed. Pam is negotiating with a hotel in downtown Fort Worth as the membership indicated a strong preference for that area. Karol Welling has graciously volunteered to be in charge of the silent auction and raffle.
- 4. Nancy updated the board on the status of ISA's application for tax exemption from the IRS and the additional documentation they require.
- 5. Denise is soliciting information to update the nanny network and the airline pregnancy policies she has on file. She is also seeking information from members on the successful balance of family and career issues.

- 6 The twenty-five dollar international member dues sponsorship program is being discontinued due to the fact no provision exists in the bylaws for differing membership rates. Alternative options were discussed.
- 7. Morgen reported the results of the 1995 scholarship program and discussed recommended changes to the program. These include adding an ATP or the international equivalent to the requirements for the airline type rating scholarships and specifying a training completion date for all scholarship recipients. An assistant will be appointed by the scholarship chairwoman to oversee the airline scholarships; the scholarship chair will continue to handle the Aviatrix Trust scholarships.

Old Business

- 1. Mail retrieval options were discussed concluding with the decision to retain the services of a professional mail forwarding service. Various services around the country will be researched.
- 2. To expand the resources available to our members through the ISA Library, Denise is soliciting updated training materials available in company stores from the membership
- 3. An update on the products available and sales made through the ISA store was given.
- 4. The application deadline for Board of Director (BOD) elections for the 1996-1998 term is November 27. Board positions available are Convention. Scholarship, and Secretary. Nancy has generously volunteered to seek reelection to the board for another term.
- 5. Each member's preference for inclusion on a selective mailing list will be solicited at the time of initial member-

ship application or renewal. The respective forms will be revised accordingly.

New Business

- 1. The locations under consideration for the 1997 convention include Amsterdam. The Netherlands, Cyprus, and Merida, Mexico. The need for a European regional membership director was discussed
- 2. The feasibility of establishing a gender issues committee within ISA to provide a support and information network for issues such as sexual harassment was dis-
- 3. The Ninety-Nines now have a private forum available on-line to members only. The possibility of setting up a meeting place for ISA members within this forum will be investigated.
- 4. Ginger Cutter reported that secondhand information from the FAA Administrator and the Federal Air Surgeon indicates that the FAA will be making a recommendation in October or November in response the letter writing campaign she conducted and the support of organizations such as ISA. It is hoped that the recommendation will include first or second class medicals for Insulin-treated Diabetics. Ginger thanked everyone for their support.
- 5. A membership drive to recruit new members prior to the Dallas convention was proposed.
- 6. A fall bicycle trip is planned for October. Details will be disseminated via CompuServe as they become available.
- 7. The next meeting will be held in November in New York city.

The meeting was adjourned at 1720 EDT.

Indian Airlines A-320 "Unmanned" Flight

Indian Airlines Captain Saudamini Deshmukh writes from Bombay that...

"On the 9th of June, 1995, I entered my airplane Airbus A-320 as a Captain, as usual. I reached the cockpit and realized that I had a woman Co-Pilot that day - Captain Mrs. Sangita Kabra Bangar. Immediately a thought struck my mind. "I wonder if all the cabin crew are also women!" I pressed the button and an airhostess came to the cockpit. I asked her if all the cabin crew were women. She went back. returned in a minute and confirmed that all the six cabin crew were airhostesses; there was no male flight purser on board.

We were all very happy to know that we were all-women-crew. We

had not heard of any previous allwomen-crew flight on the Airbus A-320 — the world's most sophisticated, computerized and flv-bvwire civil jet airliner. It was probable that our flight would be a world record.

We started our work for the flight

with renewed enthusiasm and job, with a happy smile on our faces. Half way from Bombay to Madras, I made an announcement to the passengers over the public address system. I informed them about our historic flight and introduced all the crew members. I told them that it was a very special day for us and that we were very happy to share it with them. I thanked them those with whom we operate our for being with us that day.

All the passengers clapped spontaneously at the end of the an-

nouncement and our cabin crew were thrilled to witness that extraordinary scene.

That flight and that day will remain etched in our memories forever. All our dedication, concentration and years of hard work of handling a difficult job suddenly bore fruit that day and gave us immense satisfaction. It also brought a realization that we were all mere instruments in the hands of some mighty power, call it God or by any other name.

We felt a deep sense of gratitude to all those who made that flight possible - Indian Airlines, all the pilots who taught us flying and all daily flights; and all our friends and family members who have to suffer the irregularity, uncertainty and stress of our daily lives."

CIRP: Critical Incident **Response Program**

While the professional crewmember has honed risk awareness and instant appropriate responses to a razor-sharp edge, he/she often has not been as effective in learning how to handle the medical and psychological aftermath of a critical incident.

Common Stress Reactions

Stress reactions seen most often in crewmembers are sleep problems, the of the treatment. desire to avoid situations related to the event, an increase in risk taking behaviors both on and off the job, intense anger toward the company or the system, and anger toward fellow pilots.

Fallout from this most often contributes to family problems and the crewmember starts thinking that "real estate looks good" and it is time to get out of aviation because things "just aren't like they used to be." Research from the ICISF demonstrates that more than 90% of individuals involved in a traumatic event will develop some type of adverse psychological effect. ALPA's Aeromedical Advisor, Dr. Donald Hudson stated that of those ALPA crewmembers who contacted the Aeromedical Office following a critical incident or accident, approximately 70 percent of those who received proper treatment continued their careers as pilots. Of those who did not receive treatment, however, over 70 percent left their jobs within two years of the traumatic events. Also, families suffered, marriages failed, and health declined.

A crewmember can experience substantial and long-lasting cognitive, emotional, behavioral, and physical changes that must be treated immediately to prevent additional problems. Even those who witness or participate in the rescue or investigation ment is working with APA to put to-

of an accident (like Oklahoma City) are at risk of developing PTSD. All of the crewmembers and one of the Flight Attendant accident investigators for the Aloha 243 accident, developed PTSD within two years of this event. Crewmembers have a tendency to feel that asking for support is a sign of weakness. Unfortunately, ignoring the side effects of stress can have almost irreversible effects. And proper treatment is essential to ensure complete recovery. Regardless of the degree of critical incident stress or PTSD, early intervention can greatly reduce the time and expense

Critical incident response teams have been operating for about eight years with firefighters, police and emergency service workers. The Association of Flight Attendants has been training their Employee Assistance Personnel committee members in critical incident stress for at least seven years.

ALPA plans to educate pilots in stress reduction and coping strategies in order to reduce the effects of psychological trauma. Also, each Master Executive Chairman (MEC) of each carrier has been tasked to establish a CIRP team or committee. Most have placed this program within the Safety Structure. Others have selected the Aeromedical Committee or Family Awareness /Assistance to implement the program.

Airlines Adopt CIRP Training

Alaska Airlines, Delta Air Lines, Northwest Airlines and TWA have held company-wide Critical Incident Stress Management training courses. Alaska Airlines' program is employee based, where TWA's program is company based. Delta and Northwest have not yet fully implemented the program. American, Southwest and UPS are all interested in putting together their own program. American Airlines' Crew Development Depart-

gether a program. They are in the final steps of scheduling training and soliciting for volunteers.

Critical Incident Stress Management (CISM) A lot has been learned about helping people who work in occupations where they experience traumatic events.

Genesis of the ALPA CIRP

The ALPA Critical Incident Response Program grew out of the Executive Human Performance Committee under the direction of Capt. Don Smith, Delta Air Lines, Capt. Smith assigned Capt. Robert Sumwalt, USAir to head the effort. Captains Alan Campbell, DAL and Mimi Tompkins, ALO, researched the PTSD and how to prevent it. This research lead to the writings of Dr. Jeffery Mitchell. Dr. Mitchell had been a firefighter/paramedic and returned to college to research the effects of critical incidents on emergency service workers.

In September 1994 the working group met in Hawaii to attend Dr. Mitchell's Basic CISM training and to write the CIR program. The members of the group were led by Capt. Mimi Tompkins. Working group members were Jim Johnson, ALPA Senior Attorney, Joe Bracken, ALPA Staff Engineer/Accident Investigator, Capt. Alan Campbell, DAL, Capt. Bill Morin, ALA, Joe Anding, DAL representing ALPA's Accident Investigation Board. Donald Hudson,

ALPA Aeromedical Advisor provided information by phone.

It was well known that immediate intervention following a trauma or critical incident would lessen the long term effects of stress and often prevent PTSD. However, emergency service workers, like pilot crewmembers were reluctant to talk to "shrinks". Dr. Mitchell developed a program where peer volunteers were trained in intervention techniques. At first these peers were trusted members of the team who had experienced and dealt with their own critical incident. Later, other interested and trained peer volunteers were just as successful. Peer volunteers receive training in implementation of In the case of an accident, this dethe program, Basic CISM, Peer Support, Family Support, Traumatic Stress Management (advanced peer support) and an Advanced CISM course. These courses are now provided by the ICISF's trained instructors.

Intervention Methodology

normalizes the reactions of a person involved in a critical incident and educates them on what reactions to expect in the next day or so. Also, ways to better deal with the reactions are suggested. This peer also helps them with their immediate needs.

The goal is to help the person cope and maintain their defenses so that they can deal with the many details that often result from a critical incident. This defusing is conducted by a peer volunteer and lasts about 20-30 minutes. It should be done within 8-24 hours of the incident after the crewmember. If face-to-face contact is impossible it is conducted by telephone (always with a trained volunteer). In the case of more severe trauma or an accident involving injuries or death, a debriefing will be held.

Crewmembers are familiar with "operational debriefings", whose primary concern is to resolve the safety aspects of the accident or incident. The type of debriefing conducted for critical incident stress management focuses on the effect of the event on the individual. By providing an avenue for people to talk about a particularly stressful event soon after the event occurs, they are then better able to process the event.

A debriefing is always conducted with peer volunteers and a CISM trained Mental Health Professional (MHP). No notes are taken; no rank structure is apparent. The meeting can not be used for any disciplinary action; and the information is strictly confidential. It is not unusual for a debriefing to last for several hours. briefing would be scheduled after the NTSB interview which usually occurs 3-4 days after the event. The Mental Health Professional and peer volunteers follow-up with the crewmembers or family and refer them to appropriate counseling if that is needed.

A crewmember who participates in Intervention involves a defusing that the CIRP with a defusing and debriefing is allowed to talk to a Mental Health Professional for 4-6 sessions without having to list it on the FAA medical form when renewing their medical certificate.

CIRP Uses

Critical incident teams have been used for:

- * crew sickness due to cabin air qual-
- * a passenger death in flight
- * an employee who lost her home to a fire the day before Christmas
- * turbulence incidents where crew and passengers were injured
- * near-miss incidents resulting in crew injuries
- * a senior Captain who failed a recurrent check ride
- * a crew member who administered CPR to a passenger
- * an aircraft evacuation on the run-

way

- * the Simmons accident
- * the recent Atlantic Southeast accident
- * a crewmember who lost a child in an aircraft accident
- * a crewmember involved in a near fatal automobile accident
- * accident investigators and their families following the investigation of fatal accidents

The program is still evolving. Since the Simmons accident, Capt. Rick Bicknell, SAI, was added to the working group. As a result of his experience as the CIRP Coordinator for this accident, courses in Family Support have been added to the training of peer volunteers. Peer volunteers are still needed. Training programs will be scheduled in 1996. You do not have to be an ALPA member to attend. For more information, contact Capt. Inn Touch Tips: Parenting from the Road

Editor: The following is a reprint of a brochure produced for Marriott's Residence Inn, AT&T and USA TODAY. It is reprinted with permission.

To stay Inn Touch and to do it well requires a little common sense and a lot of love. Here are some tips for you to consider both before and during your business trip.

Before You Leave

- Discuss your trip in advance with your children to help them prepare for it emotionally and logistically.
- Ask your children how they would like to stay Inn Touch while you're away. You may be impressed with their creativity! They may ask • you to take along a special item to remember them by, such as a blanket or teddy bear.
- Let your children help you pack. Use packing as an opportunity to talk about what you will do while you're away and when you return.
- Help small children understand how long you will be away by translating the number of days into concepts they

can easily understand. You can do this in a number of ways-set out their clothes for each day you'll be gone or help While You're Away them color the days on a calendar.

- Use a map to trace your travel plans. Show your children where you will be an answer their questions about far-away cities, states and countries. Ask them what they would like to know about your destination.
- Hide notes or little presents around the house before you leave, one for each day of your trip. Hide them in a sock drawer or toy chest, or tape them to stuffed animals. When you call home, tell your children where to look for a special surprise each day.
- Buy two copies of a children's book and read a story . together with your child over the phone.
- Agree with your child to keep a daily log called "What I Did Today." When you call, go over each of your lists to find out what the other did.
- Whenever possible, bring your kids with you on your trip. It's a great way for your children to spend some special time alone with you and to

understand what you do when you're working.

- Call frequently to talk with your children—at least once a day, but preferably more. Arrange to call them at a specific time or times during the day, so they'll know in advance when they can expect to talk to you.
- Use a camcorder to tape yourself reading bedtime stories or book chapters. Then have your children play a portion of the tape each night on the VCR before going to bed.
- Ask specific questions about what's going on at school or play. Note any upcoming events or activities on your calendar.
- Support your spouse or partner who's at home being mom, dad and referee. Back up your partner's parenting decisions if your children come to your for appeal.
- Mail notes or postcards from the road. Buy your children a special album or box to store your messages in. They will enjoy collecting these special notes from you.

- Pick up little gifts or mementos that reflect where you've been. This can turn a business trip into an educational journey for your child.
- Plan a special outing or some fun time with your child upon your return. Above all, keep the commitment!
- Take advantage of the latest technology. Send personal notes, riddles and jokes or homework via fax.
- Arrange a conference call that involves the whole family—you, your spouse, your children and grandparents—a virtual family reunion Explain the situation as much by phone.
- Overnight mail a gift or love note.
- Tuck your children into bed via a cordless phone.
- Leave messages on your answering machine for your children to listen to when they get home from school.

When you return home, tell your children you missed them. Tell them how much you love them Tell them how happy you are to be home. And encourage them to express their feelings as well.

Expert Advice on Staying Inn Touch

What advice to you have for the parent who's new to business travel?

The article highlights the struggle of Alice Miller, a 23 year old Israeli soldier, to become a fighter pilot. Miller has filed a petition with the Israeli Supreme Court against the Israeli Air Force. While an excellent student in aeronautics at Haifa University, the air force rejected her application to fly for the Air Force. The Air Force prohibits women from becoming combat pilots because they may become pregnant and leave the service.
