





BOD Meeting, May 1998, Las Vegas, NV USA

Meeting was called to order at 15:12 by Chairwoman Mary Ana Gilbert. Board members present were Mary Ana Gilbert, Denise Mowat, Diane Casavant, Ginger Cutter, Liz Voigt, Tiana Daugherty, Gail Redden-Jones, Nancy Novaes and Janet Coté. Members attending were Krisan Wismer, Patty Barrera, Patricia León, Keith Johnson and Elise Pistor.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

SECRETARY: (Tiana Daugherty)
MOTION - Accept the minutes
from the February Board Meeting
as printed in the Newsletter.
Passed. ISA receives numerous
requests from Jr. High and High
School students with questions
about what it takes to become an
airline pilot. Tiana is sending them
ISA's booklet, "Tips on Becoming
an Airline Pilot".

TREASURER: (Janet Coté) Presented 1st Quarter Financial Report. IRS penalty on our 1996 tax return has been dropped. ISA has received its temporary sales tax permit for the state of Nevada. The tax rate if 7%. Profits from the ISA Stores will go to the general operating account. The "Tips on Becoming an Airline Pilot" booklet go to the scholarship account. Any excess funds from the Convention will be rolled back into the General Operating Fund. Prior to the next Convention, seed money will be deposited into a

Convention Fund after receiving an itemized list of expenses.

CONVENTION: (Liz Voigt) 143 members pre-registered which brings the total to 240 people including VIP & guests. Northwest, US Airways and American Airlines all contributed large cash donations to support our Convention with Federal Express donating merchandise. Cyprus 1999 - ID 90 tickets have been secured on Cyprus Airways. The only bid so far received for 2000 is Costa Rica. Registration next year may carry a penalty for those who do not pre-register. It is too hard to plan for last minute increases with food, room size, etc.

CORP. COMMUNICATIONS:
(Nancy Novaes) Since this
position is responsible for Public
Relations and FundRaising,
discussed names that more closely
reflect it's current responsibilities.
MOTION - Change the name of
this Board position to Corporate
Communications. Passed. We will
need to get an earlier start on sales
tax applications for future
conventions. Review and present
to the Board the details of writing
an Amecus brief.

HUMAN PERFORMANCE & RESOURCES: (Mary Ana Gilbert) Has added a nice reference section to our web page regarding articles on pregnancy and flying.

EDUCATION: (Diane Casavant) Have been unable to get further information on the proposed Beryl Markham Memorial. Discussion of making ISA video available for purchase. Tabled at this time pending review of data accuracy, copyright, etc. Will try to get a picture of our brick at the Amelia Earhart Birthplace museum.

MEMBERSHIP: (Denise Mowat) Still researching automatic renewal of memberships by credit card. Publish list of non-renewals in Newsletter to assist with retention. Will be updating application brochures with current renewal rate of \$45 active and \$15 inactive. Ginger will be responsible for the newsletter and website update. An amendment to the STANDING RULES. 1.) ... (A) Membership contributions received after start of fiscal year will not be pro-rated. (B) Memberships received prior to October 1st will be applied to the current fiscal year. (C) New membership contributions received October 1st or later will be applied through the following vear. Passed. Review of extended pregnancy leave definition in the By-Laws tabled until August. New rosters available during the convention. A brochure of just e-mail addresses is available.

NEWSLETTER: (Ginger Cutter) Soliciting anyone who like to be in charge of selling advertising. Look for a new feature column on Finances. Updating committee information in the centerfold. Maintaining 3rd class postage. Unable to accept advertising if we change to non-profit 3rd class Bulk Mail.

FINANCIAL SCHOLARSHIP: (Gail Redden-Jones) Investigating means of financing additional copies of the "Tips" booklet. Working on updating information and adding a copyright statement. MOTION - 2 signatories required on any check over \$3000; Financial Scholarship Chair and Treasurer to sign on the account. AMENDMENT - 3 signatories on the Paine Webber account to include the Financial Scholarship Chair, Treasurer and Chairwoman with only 2 required on check. Passed. Complimentary convention registrations to include up to 2 guests from any contributing airline. Any additional complimentary registration with approval of the Chairwoman. The

Changes In 1997

ISA's Business Checking, Money Market, and Merchant Services (credit card processor) accounts have been consolidated into one financial institution, the Bank of America. Scholarship funds remain with PaineWebber.

In October, ISA moved from "paper processing" credit card transactions to electronic processing. The terminal can catch errors before the transactions go through, and funds are in the bank about 48 hours after processing

Notes: Committees shown with zero amounts did not report expenses. Treasurer expenses include \$508 in bank fees and the \$367 for electronic terminal purchase. "Other" expense category includes \$1075 for graphic artist services, \$432 for Captains' Club, \$210 in check charges, \$103 for business meeting room, \$82 for postage, and \$80 for 'goodwill' donation.

Scholarship Account

As of January 30th, 1998, the Scholarship account has \$74,012 invested in Mutual Funds and \$4,541 in a Money Fund, bringing the total invested assets to an account value of \$78,553.

Using the scholarship awards allocation formula, approved by the BOD, the ISA Scholarship account at PaineWebber will award approximately \$12,000 to the 1997 recipients.

New For 1998:

I am pleased to announce that now all ISA members may use a credit card to pay membership dues. While this option may be more convenient, writing a personal check (for U.S. members) is still preferred by the organization because it is more cost effective.

At the February BOD meeting, the 1998 budget was approved. This budget reflects ISA's actual operating cost (convention income/expenses and scholarship donations/distributions are not included in the operating budget). A brief breakdown of the 1998 operating budget is as follows:

Income: \$19,000 (from membership contributions, and ISA Store income)

Committee Expenses:

Notes: Education expenses factor in ISA's museum exhibits. Gender Issues is a new committee. Membership committee expenses account for the printing/mailing of the ISA directory. Newsletter reflects higher cost in outsourcing its production. Secretary expenses include mail box rental in LAS. Other includes room rental for quarterly BOD business meetings, and Captains' Club plaques. In looking at the 1998 budget, ISA will be operating at a slight deficit of about \$2,765. It was announced in the April newsletter that membership dues will increase to US\$45 for 1999 to "balance the budget". The following is a breakdown of where your \$45 membership contribution go:

Membership Report

The Las Vegas convention was a wonderful celebration of 20 years of ISA highlighted by the attendance of 15 of the original 21 charter members. ISA membership nearly topped 600 after the convention reaching its peak of 598 at the end of May. Members were from 32 countries and represented 95 different airlines. For the quarter 35 ladies joined and six returned as members. We have added four new airlines. Omni Air Express, TEA (Trans Europe Airlines), Hapag Lloyd and Condor (both Germany).

As is the norm following the convention, all non-renewing members are dropped from the active member list which resulted in a loss of 44, lowering our total to 554. Presently a membership drive is being initiated with a number of members volunteering to be coordinators at their airline: Patty Leon, Alaska; Elise Pistor, American (for new hires); Christina Redfern, America West; June Viviano, FedEx; Angie Smith, Northwest; Cindy Mandell, TWA; Heather Loomis, United (DEN base only); and Susan Gillett, UPS. Anyone else interested in introducing ISA to women pilots at your airline, by handing out ISA brochures to ladies in new hire classes and to those on the line, please notify me and I'd be happy to send you a handful of brochures.

By now all of you should have received the new and improved 1998 membership directory. With the change in binding it should last longer and be more user friendly. Unfortunately a number of errors have been found inside, for which I apologize. A list of corrections has been added to the newsletter centerfold. If you find an error or have any address, phone or e-mail changes please forward them to me as soon as possible. Prompt updates are requested to ensure proper and timely reception of newsletters and other ISA material. Also, if you did not receive a 1998 Membership directory please let me know, and I'll send one to you.

A separate e-mail booklet was printed for those on line, thanks to the efforts of Ginger Cutter. I have a number of copies available and will send one to you if requested.

One last word on the renewal process. The deadline for membership contributions is December 31 (except that non-US members may pay up to the May convention). Everyone may now pay by credit card or by check. Please note that dues has increased to \$45 per year-active membership and \$15 per yearinactive membership (furloughed, retired, on extended medical or sick leave). An optional automatic renewal is presently being investigated and should be available later in the year. To keep you up-to-date on your membership status, I will be adding to your newsletter address labels the year you are paid through adjacent to your name. (For example: Polly Pilot 98 pd) Thank-you for renewing on time.

Financial Scholarship Report

First of all, I have to say that was a great convention! Many thanks to Maggie Rose and Ginger Cutter as local liaison and registrar, Liz as convention chair, and Elise Pistor for her fabulous silent auction! Also, thanks from scholarship to Denise Mowat for pitching in at the last minute and doing the raffle.

The 1998 Scholarship Season is starting. This is the tenth anniversary of our scholarship program and we should all be proud of how much it has grown in the last ten years

Several major changes have occurred during the last year for the Scholarship Program. First, the Aviatrix Trust was dissolved and the Scholarship Fund was started under the ISA non-profit corporation code. This helps tremendously with paperwork and accounting since we only have to deal with one corporation. All funds have been deposited into a PaineWebber account which invests a percentage of moneys into different stock and bond funds. Janet Coté, our Treasurer, has taken over managing the account. Next, we have set up an allocation formula to determine the maximum amount of money to be awarded each year. Also, starting this year, 10% of the allocated funds will go toward assisting our Airline Scholarship winners with their expenses.

Our 1998 scholarship season is shaping up to be a blockbuster. Again this year, the Scholarship Program was fortunate enough to receive \$7500 from UPS and \$5000 from Northwest Airlines at the convention. Anyone working for these two airlines, please be sure to take the time to thank them.

We have also worked up solicitations kits for scholarship fund raising. Any one interested in helping, contact Keith Johnson or myself. Keith will be coordinating the effort. The airlines who have assisted the scholarship program in the past are FedEx, Northwest, United, UPS, and USAirways. If your airline is not listed and you would like to help, let us know. depicting the history of women airline pilots. The first was unveiled at the International Women's Air and Space Museum in Centerville, Ohio on March 11, 1991. Almost one year later, March 10, 1992, an exhibit was opened at the Pima Air and Space Museum in Tucson, Arizona. January 12, 1993 saw the completion of our exhibit at the International Ninety-Nines Headquarters Building in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Finished on June 10, 1993 was the Women in Aviation Room at the Yankee Air Museum in Michigan. Finally, July 17, 1994, Women in Aviation Gallery at the San Diego Aerospace Museum in San Diego, California was completed. Presently, the Ninety-Nines are expanding their museum in Oklahoma City, which we are a part of. The opening is scheduled for the summer of 1999. ISA also has a brick in the sidewalk at Amelia Earhart's birthplace in Atchison, Kansas. →

Convention Liaison Report

Thank you everyone for attending the 1998 convention. It's over now, and I thought I would give you an idea just what is involved in putting on one of these. I have attended almost every convention since the beginning, and I was surprised at everything that went into the planning.

Historically, we have requested around \$100 for registration. For this money, attendees are expecting a Tuesday night cocktail party, business meeting, lunch, and Wednesday night event. Since I was planning this convention, I decided to not have any guest speakers, or any buses. This certainly made things easier for me.

We're close to closing out the convention account, so I thought I would give you some preliminary numbers to let you know where your registration dollars went.

First I needed to find a hotel. No hotel that I talked to would give 100 rooms at an airline discount! They all gave us a convention rate which was only slightly less than their regular rate. They would have done better for us in Las Vegas if we were mostly gamblers, but most hotels know how cheap airline pilots are, therefore most of the rates I was quoted were \$90 to \$135. The hotels I considered were New York New York, Mirage, Caesar's, Hilton, Treasure Island, MGM, etc. all very upscale. If any of us were to try to find a hotel on our own, we could easily beat any of these prices. Caeser's quoted me a convention rate of \$135, however their airline discount rate was \$85. Therefore, I thank all of you for reserving rooms at Harrahs. The more rooms we bought, the more extras we got as far as convention accommodations and services.

The next thing I tried to do was find out how much to charge everyone. Since I didn't have any idea if we would get sponsorship, and I didn't know how many folks would show up, I decided to charge \$110 so I wouldn't go into the hole. I got a rough idea of how much it would cost per person per event from the hotel and added a little for audio/visual and incidentals.

As it turned out, my guess was close. About 250 people attended the social events and about 150 or so members attended the meeting. Food and entertainment alone was \$121 per person. Then adding on the audio/visual equipment increased the per person charge by \$17. Thank goodness US Airways, Northwest, and American came through with sponsorship!

The audio/visual equipment is very important to a successful and professional convention. We needed TV/VCRs, microphones, screens, and various other equipment to put in the hospitality suite, registration, business meeting, silent auction, and the Gender Issues Seminar.

Both the food and the cash bar helped to support the rent of the rooms involved, and it turned out that the food was more of a dinner than an hors d'ouevres party both nights. We needed to extend the Tuesday night party to accommodate the silent auction which was the most successful ever so the snacks were upgraded to more of a dinner. Wednesday was planned that way since I didn't give anyone time to rest, let alone, have dinner. The weather was disappointing since I really wanted everyone out by the Flamingo Pool, but the Sunset Room was beautiful, and because we were inside, Elvis sang!

Thank you, everyone, for coming, supporting ISA, supporting Harrahs, eating, drinking and enjoying our special group and all of its committees and causes. Don't foget to send in your convention critiques. They will all be passed on to Liz and Natasa Papadopolou. I will see all of you in Cyprus next year! →

recent achievements and future plans. **Gail Redden-Jones** and **Keith Johnson** then thanked the various generous donations from airlines for our scholarship program.







beds and the others slept outside in Conestoga wagons.

After a hearty breakfast on Saturday morning, we went for an exhilarating helicopter ride, four at at a time, from the ranch at the rim of the Grand Canyon to the river below, a 2000 foot descent. The helicopter pilot was an Army veteran and an excellent pilot! We were all very impressed with his flying skills! No one could figure out in advance where he was going to land the helicopter at the edge of the Colorado River because there didn't appear to be any landing pad at all. Gender Issues Committee

Sexual harassment, gender discrimination -- these are topics making today's headlines. Women in all professions are coming forward with stories and solutions to those recurring problems. As women in a non-traditional profession, we have our own tales. The Gender Issues Committee Seminar on Sexual Harassment was an opportunity to share those stories and suggest solutions.

The first seminar written by and for ISA members was held at our 1998 Anniversary Convention in Las Vegas. Lucy Young (FO US Airways) and Nancy Novaes (CA Continental) presented information and illustrations of the critical issues of sexual harassment and gender discrimination. Textbook and legal definitions were compared with real-life experiences. Our special

guest, ALPA Staff Attorney Elizabeth Ginsberg, presented the current legal definitions and answered questions about sexual harassment.

Our stories ranged from harrowing to humorous. Though women have made advances in this profession, there is still a long way to go before equality is achieved. Most airlines recognize and are actively working toward educating their employees and resolving situations before they become problems. Because we are pilots, Cockpit Resource. Management and safety are also impacted by occurrences of discrimination and harassment.

Interspersed with the presentation, real-life situations were presented as vignettes, with ISA members playing assigned roles. Helen Erskine (FO UAL) shared the "Top Ten Clues that you are flying with someone clueless"

Lynn O'Donnell (FO UAL) talked about dealing with sexual harassment when it occurs.

Whenever possible, defusing uncomfortable situations with tact or humor remains the best method. When the harassment is severe or the harasser is unrelenting, stronger measures may be appropriate. The best measure of harassment is that of the reasonable woman: how it makes you feel. As pilots, we like to believe that we can handle any situation. However, women who have been victimized by sexual harassment often say they feel "blindsided" or betrayed, caught by unwelcome surprise in a situation over which they have little or no control. The continuing efforts of the ISA GIC are devoted to education. If you are interested in participating in the ISA GIC or if you would like to find out more about our presentation and resources, contact Captain Nancy Novaes or FO Lucy Young.

Special Gender Issues Report

"EVERYDAY STRATEGIES"

Zero Tolerance is the buzzword of the 90's. Recently, there has been a spate of "Zero Tolerance" programs for several major corporations. Some of our employers have showcased new Sexual Harassment Zero Tolerance programs. My cynicism tells me that some consulting firm is making big bucks selling these prepackaged programs to big corporations to keep the government and courts off their backs. Cynicism aside, let's hope that they at least bring new perspective and discussion to an old problem

A major tenet of this zero tolerance is that you must make the perpetrator aware that his behavior is offensive, that it is unwelcome, and that you won't tolerate it. I agree. We cannot sit silently waiting for some corporation to take control of the situation. Silence is always interpreted as acceptance. Follow your gut feelings - if it makes you uncomfortable, it's time to speak up. Rarely does this need

Liz Thompson-Locke US Airways Shuttle to be confrontational, but it must be done.

Why do we need to speak up right when it happens? Three reasons. Silence is compliance. Secondly, we absorb the hostility directed at us if it is not deflected and that is a worse harm. Lastly, it is not fair for the perp to hear about this for the first time from a third party such as his chief pilot or union.

Sometimes the perp is just stupidly unaware that his behavior is offensive. He may actually think "Hey, look. Another empty kitchen" is an original and humorous line. In this case, try some gentle verbal nudges to say your piece without ruining a possible good working relationship or the camaraderie we'd like to enjoy in the cockpit.

On the other hand, if you have intentional harassment based in hostility that could be ongoing or escalating, it is imperative that you make it known early that it offends you. You will have to request that the behavior stop. And you will need to be a little more blunt about your rights and his obligations in the workplace.

If a case develops, your speaking out will keep the perp from saying he didn't know you were offended or that he thought you liked it. If the situation escalates to a full lawsuit, you will have no case if there is no history of your objections. If it seems particularly bad, write down everything he says and everything you say. This is the information you will need to take to your professional standards committee, union, chief pilot, company officials, or, worse case, lawyer. A written record of conversation is legal (tape may not be) and is considered a legal document of a meeting, so will work well in this type of incident.

IFALPA REPORT

IFALPA held its 50th Anniversary Conference in Montreal from the 23rd - 28th April. It was attended by some 400 delegates, 80 observers (like ISA) and over a hundred accompanying persons As well as the usual committee meetings, there was a one day seminar on "The Role of the Professional Pilot - Learning from the Past, Looking to the Future".

The committee meetings were well attended. Unfortunately I was the only ISA representative as the two members interested in accompanying me were unable to arrange time off. Next year's meeting will be held in Karachi, Pakistan in the 2nd week of April and the following one in Tokyo. As I mentioned at the business meeting I would like to repeat my invitation for any members interested in learning more about IFALPA to contact me (or indeed their own pilot's association) and offer their services. It is certainly more practical to have more than one attendee at the annual conference as committee meetings are carried out simultaneously and I still have not discovered a way to be in more than one place at a time!

Although ISA is only an observer at IFALPA, I was allowed by the President, Captain Rob McInnis, to distribute a written survey in order to find out the answer to the burning questions - how many women pilots are there and how many are Captains? What percentage is that of the total pilot body? I

received answers from about 30 associations and am still getting faxes from those who had to go home and look it up!

Some of the "Hot Topics" this year were - the increased use of Cockpit Voice Recorders for reasons other than accident investigation; the positive developments within ICAO to introduce mandatory safety audits in contracting states as IFALPA had been recommending for some time, the promotion of Controlled Flight into Terrain (CFIT) training by Boeing, Airbus and other manufacturers. These manufacturers have provided all customer airlines with a CD-ROM including a Management overview, decisions makers guide, operators guide and a sample CFIT training program (including video material). I was also able to obtain a copy of this CD-ROM for the ISA library, and it is well worth looking at. I also was given two copies of a book produced by Airbus outlining their history to date and one from IFALPA celebrating the first 50 years. All can be borrowed through Denise Mowat

Aviation Safety was a key point in many of the seminar speakers' addresses as well as plenary presentations. We need to be aware that only 20% of the airlines are involved in 80% of accidents. If we continue with the same rate of fatal accidents as at the moment, with current industry growth, we will have one "CNN type" accident a week in 10 years time. We have to realize that there could be drastic implications if a fatal accident occurs when the general public (and the media) has not yet forgotten the previous one. IATA is proposing a "buddy system" for flight safety in which airlines with well developed Fight Safety processes and departments will host managers and or pilots from airlines where little has been done in this area in order to share expertise. As is usual, airports and airspace worldwide were reviewed and orange, red or black stars assigned to those with deficiencies that could reduce safety margins. Please contact your pilot's association for information on this topic (ICAO Annex 19).

IFALPA has also inaugurated a web site - www@ifalpa.org and is hoping to improve its communications with the line pilots who they rightly believe to be the lifeblood of the organization. IFALPA needs more volunteers to get involved in various committees. There is something for everyone: cross-cultural factors to dangerous goods to Reduced Vertical

Separation. All these things affect us all at some time in our careers. Check out the web site and contact your association if you are interested in participating in any of the committees or work groups. >



attended this conference. I would


especially like to thank Cindy Pawlik, who organized and scheduled all the staffing for the ISA booth

We rented a video machine which repeatedly showed the ISA video and we displayed a great looking poster made by Krisan Wismer. The poster

depicted the 9 steps of the scholarship process from the receipt of the airline's donation, through the interview process of the applicants, to the completion of the training.

We handed out Scholarship Information sheets and kept the Scholarship Application packets under the table to only hand out to qualified applicants. I brought about 80 Scholarship Information sheets and 50 applications. We ran out of everything the very first day! Fortunately, Kinko's was only 2 blocks away and we kept them busy! By the end of the conference, we handed out over 200 information sheets. We sold 25 booklets, "Tips on How to Become an Airline Pilot" written by Gail Redden-Jones at \$1.00 and exhausted our supply the first day. We also sold some children's books I had brought along illustrating career role models for children, many of them female, including a female airline pilot. We managed to net \$50.00 for the Scholarship Fund.

To our great surprise, we also recruited some new members for ISA+21. We had displayed our membership brochures on the table to let people know about our

Since 1991, Dr. Boyd has been researching the subject of pregnancy and the female pilot and acting as consultant to individual pilots, airlines, pilot unions, and company flight departments. She consults with individual women pilots on a pro bono basis and disseminates information on this subject in articles in aviation magazines and academic periodicals, as well as speaks at conferences and seminars -- including ISA's 1996 Convention in Fort Worth.

Any woman pilot with concerns about company maternity policies, pregnancy clauses in union contracts, maternity uniforms, medical issues, or other topics relating to a present or future pregnancy, may contact Dr. Boyd to receive information free of charge. From this informed position, many ISA members and other women pilots have educated their obstetricians about the physical influences of the flight environment, been proactive in deciding how long to fly while pregnant, planned their maternity leave to suit their particular needs, and became involved in developing maternity policies at their airline or company.

In addition to her *pro bono* work for women airline pilots, Dr. Boyd acts in an advisory capacity for Women in Corporate Aviation, and is currently working on a long-term study of health and working conditions for the Association of Women in Aviation Maintenance.

Dr. Boyd is very active in the aviation community as a professor of aerospace education, as a mentor

and facilitator of networking and mentoring programs, as a private pilot working on additional ratings and renovating her Grumman Tiger, and as an active member and leader in organizations such as The Ninety-Nines, Women in Aviation, International, Women Military Aviators, and the Aerospace Medical Association.

"High Finance": Don't Dismiss Dividends From Your Stock Investing Equation

(ed. note: This is the first in a series of financial articles that will be printed in the ISA News. With apologies to our non-U.S. members, this information will probably be pertinent only to our members who invest in the United States.)

When you think about the "returns" from your stock investments, you probably think first and foremost about the increase in a stock's price. While price growth is a key reason many of us invest in stocks, you may be surprised to know that dividends actually can make a highly significant contribution to a stock's total return. What does this mean for you and your stocks? It means you should remember dividends as part of your stock investing equation.

American funds recently noted that over the past 20 years stock dividends have accounted for nearly 60% of the total return of the S&P 500 composite, an index of 500 widely held stocks. Though past performance cannot guarantee future results, you can see how much dividends can determine your stock's overall value.

Usually paid in quarterly intervals, dividends offer many investors a source of steady income. But if you don't need the cash right away, and your dividend payments are not large enough to invest in other stocks, you may want to consider using a Dividend Reinvestment Program (DRP) to help enhance your stock's long-term return potential.

A DRP is a convenient way for you to purchase additional shares of a stock you already own and can serve as a valuable, long-term investment strategy. Instead of receiving your dividends in cash, a DRP allows you to immediately direct that money toward buying additional shares of the company's stock. As an investor, you can benefit from having more shares if the market value increases, and that "small" dividend amount could help grow your stock's value to a big sum over time. Some companies and investment firms allow you to reinvest your stock dividends at little or no charge.

Not yet convinced of the power of dividends? Consider the following example: Let's say you had purchased \$10,000 worth of Coca-Cola stock on January 1, 1987. If you never reinvested the dividends, the market value of your stock holdings as of November 28, 1997, plus the dividends you received over that time period, would have been \$139,676. However, if you had reinvested the dividends from your original investment, the market value would have been \$157,992 — a 13% improvement! Keep in mind this example is for illustration purposes only, is not necessarily a recommendation for purchase, and does not reflect the effect of taxation or commission charges. However, this example does clearly illustrate the potential long-term benefit of a DRP to your stock's total return.

Obviously, not all DRPs can provide this type of return potential, and a DRP does not necessarily guarantee profitability. Also keep in mind that you will still be taxed on your dividends, regardless of whether you receive them in cash or use them to buy additional shares.

While you have seen the role dividends can play in your stock investing, you should always remember to select stocks that, above all else, match your investment objectives, risk tolerance and time horizon. If you truly feel uncomfortable owning a particular stock, its dividend probably won't help you sleep better at night.

The Bottom Line: Don't forget about dividends and DRPs. Without any additional out-of-pocket expenses and the potential for greater stock returns, a DRP may be one of the easiest and most profitable strategies you ever use.
