

Board of Directors Meets, Previews Convention 2001 Site

The Spring Board of Directors Meeting was held in Anchorage, Alaska, at the proposed Convention 2001 site, the famed Alyeska Resort.

Nanc Briot (Education) outlined the various enquiries for information that she had responded to in the last quarter. She has purchased water resistant tube containers to ship the ISA banners in. Hopefully this will help preserve them for future years.

Liz Jennings Clark (Convention) gave a rundown of the current year's convention activities as well as introducing Chris Grohs who will be running Convention 2001 in Anchorage. Up to the meeting time there had been no sponsoring forthcoming though Helena De Andreis was hoping to persuade LACSA to contribute. Susan Gillett had found a member (Debby Harvey) prepared to run the Silent Auction.

We then discussed ways to improve Board communication and attendance at meetings. Nanc suggested holding all meetings in a year in the same (central) city and setting the dates at the May board meeting. Patricia Barrera had already suggested that guidelines for hosting meetings be included in the Operations Manual. We also discussed how to ensure that information, discussions and decisions are handed on from one period to another. In recent years there has been a high turnover of directors and information often seems to disappear as we delete emails, resulting in having to re-invent the wheel every couple of years. We resolved to try and keep better records as a group.

As the written reports from Membership and Treasurer were not available and no other reports had been forthcoming, this concluded the meeting. The next Board meeting will be Monday 8th May in Costa Rica.

Once again ISA's membership has surpassed the 600-member mark with 604 members total, representing 31 countries and 99 airlines. We have 102 non-US members. This year, 60% of the membership paid their dues on time, which is a marked improvement over past years. Thank you! In addition, many past members have re-joined ISA. They are listed below. Welcome back!

The annual ISA directory will be published just after the convention and sent to your homes in June. So, please hold on to your 1999 directory until that time.

Something new is in the works. We have begun to issue member ID numbers. This is your exclusive number as long as you remain a continuous member with ISA. It will soon be useful for you to access a secure, members-only section of our website. Also, it will have additional uses in the future. Your number is now on your mailing label. You will see a series of numbers after your name, for example: 0266-2000. The first four numbers are your member ID number, and the second four digits represent the year for which your dues are paid. For those of you who still haven't paid your dues yet this year, your label will look like this: 0266-99 pd. The access to the website will be announced by the webmaster, Ginger Cutter, when it is available.

ISA business cards are now available for members who want to use them to solicit new members at their airlines. Treasurer's Report

Scholarship Fund:

In February, scholarship donations totaling \$2,421, collected from July through December 1999, were deposited into the Paine Webber account. I recently spoke with our PW representative regarding the PACE investment performance for 1999. You will be pleased to hear that in the 2.5 year period ISA has been in the PACE portfolio, investment earnings alone have totaled \$33,000. Annual return has been 12.4% compared to an index of 11.9% for the period. 1999 was definitely a great year for stocks, however the same is not true for the first half of 2000. ISA's portfolio is diversified enough that it should withstand any market slump this year. It was also decided that instead of investing in a declining market, the \$21,791 in cash would not be invested until the market improves. This money will still be earning interest at approximately 5.48%.

·The BOD approved a \$3,500 contribution to Forum Pictures to help sponsor their documentary film called "High Flying Women". ·Tax form 990 will be filed with the IRS prior to the Costa Rica convention, due to the May 15th filing deadline being so close. ·\$10,000 from ISA's checking account will be moved into the Money Fund account (Bank of America) to earn interest of 5.13%.

501(c)3 Review:

Sylvia Paoli is completing IRS paperwork which will determine if ISA is supported publicly or privately. The forms will be sent to the IRS by March 31st. This is the last step in ISA's final determination process.



Convention Chair Report

I hope that all of you have been busy getting the time off and registering for Costa Rica! When you get this there will not be much time left as the hotel and convention registration closes on **April 15**th. CONVENTION & ACTIVITIES SUMMARY:

GETTING THERE:

San José (Juan Santamaria International Airport, SJO) is easy to get to. LACSA, the national airline, flies to San Francisco, Los Angeles, Dallas FTW, Miami, Orlando, Washington and New York as well as Toronto. United has daily flights to SJO from Los Angeles and Washington; Continental flies (also daily) from Houston and American from Miami and Dallas. Air Canada flies from Toronto several times a week. LTU flies from Germany and Martinair from Holland.

THE HOTEL:

The Camino Real Intercontinental San Jose is situated just 15 minutes from the airport and is located amid tropical gardens facing the modern Multiplaza Mall. 260 tastefully decorated rooms offer unparalleled views of the Central Valley. Each room features 24-hour room service, air conditioning, cable television, voice mail, laundry and valet services. PRICING AND **CANCELLATION POLICY:**

Up to April 30th the standard fee applies. From May 1st a \$25 surcharge will apply and for those registering at the convention a \$50 surcharge will be levied. Costa Ricans call themselves "Ticos" and follow the creed of "Pura Vida" i.e. don't worry-be happy! This will be a great atmosphere in which to get

reacquainted, with music and dance in the background. Wednesday will of course have the normal early morning start as the **Annual Business Meeting** promises to be as busy as ever. Coffee will be available throughout as we are experimenting with a "no coffee break" format in order to allow more time for necessary discussions. Next will be the **group photographs**.

While we are working guests and HALPs (husbands of airline pilots) can enjoy a morning trip to the Izaru Volcano and Orosi Valley. I recently took this trip and also looked into the Irazú volcanic crater with its green lake - walking (just a bit dizzy) up near the clouds above an altitude of 11,000ft (without supplementary oxygen)!. The top of the volcano has often been described as the only surface on earth that so closely resemble a lunar landscape - on one occasion by no less an authority than Neil Armstrong! On a clear day, one can catch a glimpse of both the Pacific and Atlantic coasts from this imposing height. This tour offers an unique combination of Irazú, Costa Rica's highest volcano, the old capital city of Cartago and the picturesque Orosi Valley, home of the first Spanish settlers and rich in colonial history. This is a half day tour that will leave from the hotel at 7 am (Price \$34). It will return at 1230 in time for everyone to join us for the Captain's Plaque Presentation Luncheon. This will be combined with a short ceremony where any scholarship checks will also be presented.

We are looking into a couple of aviation related **seminars** that we hope to present on Wednesday afternoon. These are not yet finalized and will be included in the extra mailing. Similarly Wednesday evening plans are still being negotiated. The information will be given to you when fully developed.

On Thursday we have an excursion planned that will show you the amazing beauty of Costa Rica. As we travel northwest of San José along the Cordillera de Tillarán we will stop at a village where artisans still construct amazingly brightly painted oxcarts. We then descend toward the Northern lowlands first stopping for lunch and then on to the village of Fortuna. From here it is a short drive in the shadow of the Arenal volcano to our destination - the Tabacon **Resort**. The huge mass of the (active) Arenal volcano dominates the scenery for miles around. I was also lucky to see it on a fairly cloudless day when the smoke and fumes were easily visible. But if I thought I was impressed then, that all changed after sunset - the volcano's activity, a fairly constantly reoccurring "spitting out" of orange magma was entrancing! Every neck was craned to get the best view with "oohs!" and "aahs!" echoing all around.

In the meanwhile I had been relaxing in the resort's naturally heated pools geo-thermally heated water flowing down from near the volcano is guided between beautifully landscaped gardens over waterfalls and "rapids" into pools where the most weary of travelers will be rejuvenated. For those into serious rejuvenation there are also (volcanic) mudpacks and mud baths available on request. After soaking in the steamy pools and marveling at the volcano's pyrotechnics, we will then tuck in to a sumptuous buffet eaten on a balcony where we can still catch a glimpse of the magma rolling down the mountainside. Visit the resort's site at <u>www.tabacon.com</u>. All this will set you back a mere \$65 per person including both lunch and dinner. It will be an experience you will never forget.

SIDE TRIPS:

These will both be offered either before or after the convention so as to accommodate as many members as possible. I have personally had the chance to experience both of these trips (although in a shorter one day format) and can't even begin to tell you how amazing they both were (though you could check with my friends and colleagues who have had to put up with me going on (and on) about what a great time I had.

First, we have **Pacquare River** White Water Rafting.. This is a two day all inclusive trip that will take you to Costa Rica's most beautiful river to experience world class rafting with class 3 and class 4 rapids in scenery that is unsurpassable. The first day starts with the journey from San José bringing you to the starting point a shallow, quiet stretch where, after you don helmets and lifejackets professional guides explain the safety drills and what you need to do to keep the raft under control. A safety kayak accompanies rafts to aid any rescue efforts but on the day I went (with a lot of firsttimers) only one person fell out & she was back onboard in less than a minute! The course offers many thrills as you begin to navigate down the Pacuare River until you reach the Pacquare Lodge, where you disembark, have lunch and stow your stuff. In the afternoon you will be able to hike into the rain forest and admire the natural waterfalls. As dusk settles you can listen to the noises of the forest, enjoy your supper and pretend to be Indiana Jones!

The next day after a hearty breakfast you will be ready for even more rapids and the more challenging parts of the river. At the same time you will be travelling through some of the most unspoiled

scenery in the country. You then leave the river near the town of Siquirres and return to San Jose via the spectacular Braulio Carrillo National Park. Rate per person based on Single, Double or Triple US\$ 224.

Our second offering is a three day/ two night journey to the unspoiled Caribbean coast and the Tortuguero National Park and Canal System. On the first day an early morning departure will take you through cloud forest and rain forest in one of Costa Rica's most scenic parks,to the lowlands of Limon where you will stop for breakfast then continue through acres of banana plantations to a boat on the coffee colored river for a journey into the heart of Tortuguero National Park. On the way to the lodges where you will spend the next two nights you will get your first glimpses of herons, kingfishers, crocodiles and the exotic flora usually only seen in expensive bouquets. The arrival route travels through two rivers, one manmade canal and then several natural canals and waterways. The lodges include showers, ceiling fans and mosquito netting to give you an undisturbed stay. In a central complex you will find the reception office and a large dining room.

On the 2nd day your naturalist tour guide will to give you the chance to explore more of the canals in this lush rain forest region, travelling on a smaller boat that can fit in narrower waterways that intertwine in this area. You will also get the chance to be real "up close and personal" with the wildlife while walking through the trails of the park. Brightly colored frogs, various breeds of monkey as well as iguanas and sloths are waiting for you. In the afternoon you will visit the little village of Tortuguero where hundreds of green turtles return to nest each year. Although our convention lies outside the nesting period, there is an interesting information center including a presentation covering the work of an American researcher who initiated the tagging of turtles many years ago in an effort to learn more about these little understood animals. You can adopt your own personal turtle hatchling, receive its photo and be notified if it turns up again! (great idea for kids of all ages!). Then take a stroll on the nesting beach and walk through a primitive village before being taken by boat on the 5 minute trip across the waterway back to the hotel.

On the last morning you can laze around a bit enjoying the peace and tranquility of these green surroundings, enjoy your breakfast and then head back to the Camino Real, first by boat and then on a

Notes About the Special Supplement

During the 1999 Convention in Cyprus, your ISA Board put forth a motion they had passed earlier in the year. (The Board motion is spelled out in full in the sidebar).

This was a BOARD motion, meant to bring up discussion. A spirited debate followed, one that ALL members really need to hear. It basically broke down into two separate issues: Do we allow just anyone to join as an Associate? If not, do we allow commuter and express pilots to join?

Facts include:

- New Associate Members would give us a better volunteer base and only slightly more income, but also a ready supply of new active members when they qualified for such.
- Out of over 600 members, it's a shame that we have to go outside our group to be able to man (woman!) the booths and events that we put on.
- Volunteerism is at an all-time low.

There were many comments, both pro and con, and good questions. However, there were no motions from the floor for a vote and there was general agreement that more discussion is needed, with ALL members of ISA involved.

Therefore, this discussion has been included as a Special Supplement of the Newsletter for the past several issues. If a motion is made at the 2000 Convention in Costa Rica, there would then later be a vote by all members on that motion.

Many of you have been quite passionate about this issue in the past and in Cyprus. Be assured that this Special Supplement will NOT be sent to anyone who is not in good standing with ISA and will not be sent to sponsors or guests who request these issues. This is a private discussion only to be among ISA members.

Thank you to all who have responded in the ensuing discussion!

Previous BOARD Motion: Associate Member

(Not a motion from the Convention floor)

The Chairwoman shall bring to a vote at the General Meeting in 1999 in Cyprus the following:

Change the Bylaws to reflect a new membership category - Associate Membership.

The Associate Member will be any person who wishes to support ISA in its scholarship and education endeavors. They need not be a woman nor a pilot. Membership will only entitle an Associate Member to quarterly ISA News. They will not be entitled to Convention admission except as a guest of a current ISA Member.

Change Standing Rules, as necessary, to include Associate Membership with contributions of \$25.00 per year.

Dear Editor,

I am one of the few that were previously "blessed" with the title of "Associate Member" to ISA+21. Most of you may not remember that this position did once exist. I no longer remember all of the requirements, however, the requirement that allowed me to join prior to flying 90,000# turbojets was flying large aircraft for a commuter airline.

I remember how excited I was when I was admitted to ISA. I couldn't afford to attend any of the functions (and therefore could not volunteer my time to help), but just getting the newsletter was an inspiration. I could read the words and experiences of women who had made it to the field that I aspired to reach. Each quarter I read the magazine from cover to cover. Names like Lori Griffith (ne: Cline), Emily Howell Warner, Julie Clark, Claudia Jones (ne: Sorenson), Terry Rinehart, Beverly Bass, and Denise Blankenship (ne: Ownedoff) were etched in my mind.

When I met each one over the years I was thrilled to be able to convert a revered icon into a living, breathing

humanitarian. I had the opportunity to give my thanks to many of these leaders for creating such a wonderful organization and for letting those of us on the outside "window shop" by receiving the magazine during our various timebuilding apprenticeships.

Shortly after the time that I transferred into full membership the "rules" were changed to exclude people exactly like myself. I do not have time to go back and read those issues (yes, I've kept them all), but I vaguely recall that some of the elite wanted to avoid being role-models and interview practice for wannabes. Apparently some up-andcoming young women had interfered with the "fun" of these "already made-its." I am still upset that this small inconvenience to a few ruined the program for the rest of the commuter pilots.

No, I haven't spent much time volunteering for ISA. It hasn't been due to this affront. Rather, it has been that I have been defending pilots from the vagaries of the FAA, et.al., at the FAA Headquarters level as a representative to the Air Traffic Procedures Advisory Committee (ATPAC), as well as at the research level by participating in the SAE G-10, Laser Hazards Subcommittee. I have been able to shave a little more time from my home life to do some interviewing for ISA scholarships, so that fulfills my

"do one thing" obligation. So please don't misidentify the fact that you rarely see my name in the newsletter as being apathetic or inactive, as I am far from both.

There is another organization that has done what I feel that ISA should have been doing all along in its desire to promote women pilots. That organization is Women in Aviation, International, It is open to all job aspects and desires and is even open to men. It picked up where ISA dropped the ball. And it ran, oh, did it run! At this year's convention we had 2500+ women pilots, controllers, mechanics, flight attendants, and wanna-bes or usedto-bes from all ages between 8 and 80+. We gave out almost \$400,000 in scholarships. ISA has even been coming to these for the last few years and participating in several fashions. But, don't foist off our responsibility to encourage young women to only one avenue. We have the opportunity to educate. entrance, and encourage young women that have only heard about us and only want to receive the magazine and hold us up as role models and proof that it can happen to them, too.

I encourage you to vote to allow the resurrection of some variety of Associate Membership. My preference would be to limit it to women commuter pilots. Don't expect anything more than their

dues. Their schedules are tighter than yours and their income but a fraction of yours. Yes, you may have to answer questions and they may want assistance in determining which carriers to work for, but they are going to have an advantage that you never had. They are up-andcoming during a major pilot shortage the likes of which this country has never seen before. Their time of indentured servitude in the commuters, corporate ops, and the myriad ways that one can build time will be much shorter than that of most of you. If you want them to join you when they are fully qualified, encourage them now! You can use their dues money to bolster the scholarship funds and when they have the time off and the ability to share a room with someone so that they can afford the hotels, they will donate their time to people the booths.

Now is not the time to continue to be an elitist or snobbish group of socialites. Now is the time to sow the seeds from which your future membership will be drawn both at ISA and at your respective airlines.




- Named: after the Air Force Base where I was born (Patrick AFB).

Girdwood, Alaska (near Anchorage)

Girdwood, originally named Glacier City, was founded as a gold mining town at the turn of the century with several gold claims being staked on Crow Creek and the Virgin and California Creek drainages. As the number of miners increased, a supply camp arose that also supplied a trail stop on the route between Seward and Ship Creek which is now Anchorage. James Girdwood was an Irish immigrant and linen merchant with four gold claims on Crow Creek. He later became the namesake for this mountain community.

Though founded as a mining town, the development of Girdwood was spurred by railroad construction begun by the Federal Government in 1915. The little town boomed with new businesses. Mining in the upper Crow Creek area continued into the late 1930's when mine closures by a World War II presidential order made Girdwood a near ghost town. In 1949 Girdwood again flourished as construction began on the Seward Highway connecting the seaport of Seward to Anchorage. In 1954 eleven local men formed the Alyeska Ski Corporation along with the beginnings of the hard-earned dream of a first-class ski resort. In 1960, the first chair lift and a day lodge was built.

Francoise de Gunzburg, a Frenchman and a member of the Rothechild Banking family managed to secure a used chair lift from France that was dismantled, shipped to Alaska and rebuilt at Alyeska.

Then, tragedy struck. On Good Friday in 1964, an earthquake with the magnitude of 9.2 dropped the coastal edges along the Turnagain Arm 8 to 10 feet! Consequently, the townsite of Girdwood moved two and 1/2 miles up the valley to the present location. Three years later, the resort was sold to Alaska Airlines and the present General Manager, Chris von Imhof, then the Director of Tourism for the State of Alaska, was hired to run the resort. The Nugget Inn, the original hotel, was built and a second chair lift was constructed on the upper mountain.

Finally, in October 1980, Seibu Corporation purchased Alyeska Resort and invested heavily in its development. Seibu built a new high-speed quad chair, a fixed quad and a 60 passenger aerial tramway. In 1994 the Westin Alyeska Prince Hotel, a luxurious 307-room hotel, was opened, including a mountaintop facility with a fine dining restaurant and skier's cafeteria.

Girdwood has much to offer the Alaskan visitor all year-round: a mercantile, a post office, a variety of B&B's, restaurants and bars, boutiques and shops. Come visit. You'll like it.

ISA Woman Among UAL's Ten Thousand

Captain Linda Morley-Wells, a United Airlines pilot for 22 years, is the first woman to serve as a captain of the company's huge Boeing 777. Captain Morley-Wells commanded her first 777 trip on January 20.

By tenure the ninth most senior woman pilot among several hundred women now included among the more than ten thousand United Airlines pilots, Captain Morley-Wells has previously flown DC-10, 727, and 737 aircraft. All are dwarfed by the 777, the engine housing of which is the same diameter as the widest part of the 737's fuselage.

A 777 captain controls a thousand computers, connected by a thousand miles of wiring. The aircraft's twin engines develop 180,000 of pounds of thrust, over 4 times the thrust of most 737s. Depending upon model and configuration, a 777 can carry from 300 to 550 passengers for distances of between 5,900 and 8,800 miles. United uses the 777 for long-range domestic flights and flights to Europe, Hawaii, South America, and Asia.

Captain Morley-Wells and her husband Walter, a pilot for U.S. Airways who was her first flight instructor 26 years ago, live in San Carlos, California.

Indrani Becomes First Woman A300 Commander

Capt. Indrani Singh has recently achieved the distinction of becoming the first woman commander on the A300 aircraft 'in the whole of Asia', according to a recent article in The Family Newspaper of *Indian Airlines*

Indrani operated her first flight in command on September 16. She will be operating International routes, as well Having joined Indian Airlines in 1987, Indrani had logged a total of 3200 flying hours when this article appeared. Indrani attributes her rapid shift to the left seat to the new agreement for career progression of pilots. Indian Airlines at present has nineteen women pilots, of whom five are Commanders.

Despite all the thrill and excitement of this achievement, Indrani has her feet firmly planted on the ground. Her high-profile job has not stopped her from pursuing her hobbies and interests, reading, writing, painting, singing, dancing, fliding, parasailing, golf. Indrani lets out a little secret - her ambition to go into space! She can't say how or when, but go she will, she says

As Commander, Indrant's one wish is to have an all-woman crew on an A300 flight.

"Careful Planning May Help You Retire Sooner"

Many Americans dream about retiring early and having the chance to do more of what they want in life. For some, retirement may mean more than just a time to relax - it can mean an escape from the office and time to explore the world. Others may want to start new ventures or balance a part-time job with more time for hobbies, friends and family.

Whatever you ideal retirement picture, you may be able to make it a reality sooner than you think. The following six steps will help you assess your progress to date and establish a plan to make early retirement possible.

Visualize your retirement. To chart your shortcut to retirement, you must first determine what "retirement" means to you. At what age do you want to retire, and where and how do you want to spend your time?

If possible, "practice" your planned lifestyle during vacations and time off from work. You may find that you get frustrated with so much time on your hands and are a person who needs to keep busy with travel or clubs. Knowing this may help you plan better for retirement and provide a smoother transition when you do retire.

Estimate your expenses. Defining your retirement picture will help you put a price tag on it - and thus set your retirement income target.

Expenses that could change in your retirement include housing (you may downsize or move to a popular retirement destination), taxes (your income may change or you may move to a place with lower local taxes) and family obligations (you may want to provide financial help for children, grandchildren, or elderly parents). Also, keep in mind the added expenses for things such as travel, hobbies and health care. A common rule of thumb is that you will need 70 percent to 80 percent of your income today to retire comfortable. Then, of course, you will need to adjust this amount for inflation, before and after your retire.

The more accurate your estimate of retirement expenses, the less likely you'll be caught short of cash during your golden years.

Determine your income sources. To plan for early retirement, you may first need to look at income sources other than retirement plans and Social Security. These could include a company pension if you have one (the age at which pensions become variable varies), investment income, a new career or a part-time job.

You can also tap your IRAs early without penalty by making annual withdrawals based on your life expectancy. Otherwise, you can make penalty-free withdrawals from your IRAs, 401(k)

earlier if certain conditions are met) and tax-deferred annuities starting at age 59 ½. Social Security is available at reduced benefits at age 62 and at full benefits at ages 65-67, depending on when you were born.

Add all your projected income sources to determine whether they match or are less than your expenses. If they match, congratulations! If expenses exceed your projected income you may need a plan.

Close the gaps. Don't be discouraged if your projected income is short of your estimated retirement expenses. You may be able to bridge this gap by following an investment plan that helps you accumulate the needed funds. Otherwise, you may have to plan to spend less money or delay retirement.

Maximizing contributions to your 401(k) or other retirement plan at work is a good way to save more money for retirement. With pre-tax contributions, ongoing tax deferral and possible employer match, such plans can be an effective way to build retirement wealth. Contributions and earnings are taxed when withdrawn. Depending on your situation, IRAs (traditional or Roth), tax-deferred annuities and taxable investments may also make sense for your goal.

Even if you want to retire in just five or ten years, your regular investments - and any compounded earnings - may make a big difference in your nest egg later.

Understand your health care options. One expense that can cripple an early retirement is major medical care for an illness or accident. Knowing your health care options in advance can help you budget for them and avoid being wiped out by major medical bills.

As early retiree, you will need to find affordable protection that covers you and any dependents. Review your current coverage to determine what coverage, if any, you'll have and seek the advice of a knowledgeable advisor to determine your options.

Update your plan at least annually. As you can see, developing a plan today may help to provide a comfortable retirement tomorrow. However, your plan should be reviewed as you make more decisions on how, when and where you want to retire.

To help you make the most of your "final approach" to early retirement, consider meeting with a knowledgeable financial advisor at least annually to assess your progress and update your strategy as needed. As securities markets fluctuate, tax laws change and your needs evolve an advisor can be a great resource to help keep you on track.
