Book review

Human Error - by Design? by Simon Bennett, Perpetuity Press, 2001, ISBN # 1899287728; review by Evelyne Tinkl, ISA Chair/Corporate Communications Chair.

Anyone desiring an objective and well researched introduction to human factors and aviation accidents should read *Human Error - by Design?*. Dr. Bennett is director of the Risk, Crisis & Disaster Management Centre at the University of Leicester/ England. His research objectives are technological failures and their sociotechnical aspects. In this book, he examines a cross section of early aviation accidents.

Dr. Bennett's excellent understanding of commercial aviation is skillfully combined with his ability to explain the complexities (no jargon is used) of aviation accidents to industry outsiders. He explains the difference between latent or built in accident factors and operational or user errors; he then shows effectively how taking a systemic or broader look at accidents can reveal a new dimension of such events

Dr. Bennett also discusses a contemporary issue: treatment of aircraft accidents by news media. He shows how the media's concentration on "who's to blame" distracts the public's attention from underlying and more severe issues.

In summary, a good and instructive book, a must-read for anyone interested in aviation.



ISA's most junior members have been hit hard by furloughs and layoffs. Many women pilots who have not heard of ISA have also been seriously affected. Look at your company's furlough list to identify women who are not ISA members. Take a moment out of your day to call a furloughed pilot and keep her in the loop about what's happening at your company. Consider giving an ISA membership as a gift; you might make a new friend. Now, more than ever, we need to tap our collective resources to help our membership.

Recently, while discussing my concerns of furlough with other crewmembers, a captain

said to me "What are you worried about? Your husband has a job." It's a little more than depressing to be reminded that many men still don't think of aviation as a career for women. They seem to think that we're just flying to pass the time, maybe earn a little extra cash. The reality is that many of us are the primary, even sole sources of income for our families; women with partners in aviation may be experiencing twice the uncertainty.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Critical Incident Response Team

The horrific events of September 11 were nothing the Critical Incident Team Peer Volunteers could have trained for or even envisioned. Most training scenarios involve a single aircraft accident, with Peer Volunteers flying in to the nearest city to assist crew, family members, and accident investigators. Peer volunteers are trained to provide "emotional first aid" to fellow crewmembers in the accident crew domicile or locations such as Wash. D.C., where the CVR is transcribed by the NTSB. Since the nation's air transportation system was shut down, CIRP resources had to be deployed to the nearest domicile via automobile or train. ISA CIRP members responded in many cities, assisting crews from many different

The FAA has changed its view of the Critical Incident Response program. In the past, CIRP assistance was totally confidential and did not have to be listed on FAA medical forms unless the pilot visited a mental health or medical professional who provided a psychiatric diagnosis or detected substance abuse. The good news: CIRP assistance is still confidential and no records are kept. After CIRP interventions, peer volunteers may suggest that a crewmember consult an MHP (mental health professional) if they perceive that person may develop Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD). It is up to the crewmember to take that step, and, e.g., call the company EAP (employee assistance program) for MHP information.

The change has to do with reporting visits to Mental Health Professionals. Due to media attention on critical incident response and counseling for pilots, Drs. Jordan and Pakull (FAA Air Surgeon and Chief Psychiatrist) have discussed pilots reporting visits to Mental Health Professionals. Pilots have the option to discuss with their Aviation Medical Examiner all visits to Mental Health professionals before they list them on the FAA medical form. The FAA wants pilots to list all visits to Mental Health

Professionals on the medical form, including visits resulting from referral because of CIRP defusing or debriefings

There is no change to the letter saying that pilots do not necessarily have to list marriage or family counseling. The AME has to determine that there is no psychiatric diagnosis, chemical dependency or substance abuse. The pilot may get a letter from the FAA asking for more details from a mental health professional, whereupon the pilot should request ALPA or other union aeromedical doctor screening. Information will not be given to the aeromedical doctor without a release from the pilot.

CIRP was a resounding success, helping crews all over the system, handing out stress management information to crews who had been stranded for days, or who were just returning to work after the tragedies. Group interventions held in domiciles all over the country, thanks to groundwork laid by airline and union CIRP teams, with tremendous cooperation from airline pilot volunteers, were very effective.


affordable Convention, and for those who have more discretionary income, there will be some recommendations for more extensive side trips.





MEMBERS IN THE SPOTLIGHT

Friends of the Family - And Other Amazing People

The illustration on the cover of the October issue of Centennial Aviation & Business

Journal immediately caught my attention; it reminded me of the work of an old family friend, a British artist named Douglas Ettridge.

I was delighted to discover that it was, indeed, one of his paintings, and the article inside featured a photo of a white-haired gentleman wearing a very familiar grin. Mr. Ettridge! How often I had thought of him over the past 37 years. Why, the last time we were all together, I was only 14.

My dad, a crop duster pilot in Tracy, CA, invited a friend over for dinner sometime around 1960. Our visitor was an Englishman, a slender bachelor in his thirties. He specialized in aviation art, and was trying to get his career going in the United States.

I was 10 at the time, had hopes of growing up to be an artist myself (if my original dream of becoming a professional pilot could not be realized), and felt flattered that Mr. Ettridge always encouraged me and praised my work. He was someone I looked up to - a 'real' artist who painted

breathtakingly beautiful aerial scenes that appeared to be miles in depth, with aircraft in the foreground so natural-looking you could almost smell the exhaust. His mastery at portraying natural light made his canvasses appear to be illuminated from within.

Doug Ettridge was a regular and welcome guest in our home, and occasionally we would travel to Van Nuys to see his art exhibits. When I was in high school, I noticed that he didn't seem to come around much anymore. Dad proudly explained that our friend's talents were becoming widely recognized, and he was enjoying a busy and successful career in the United States as well as at home in the United Kingdom.

I went away to aviation college in the 1970s, and my parents would relay news from Mr. Ettridge's occasional correspondence. The last we heard from him was a heartfelt letter of sympathy over the death of my father in a freak crop dusting accident.

Life went on for all of us; I was completely enamored with flying, and was eventually hired as a pilot for Umted Airlines. So here I was, decades later, married and a mother of two, reading of the worldwide recognition our old friend had achieved as a renowned

aviation artist. And he was having an art display in Van Nuys, CA, right over the time of our children's fall break from school! We quickly altered our vacation plans to include his exhibit.

In the midst of admiring what was only a sampling of his impressive and prolific collection of hundreds of paintings, he called me over to introduce me to a woman he called an old friend - Bobbi Trout.

My knees almost gave way in mid-hello. The short, smiling woman with the firm handshake, knurled cane and blazer decorated with flying medals was an aviation pioneer I'd read about since I was a little girl. While she seemed impressed when Doug introduced me as a 757/767 captain for United Airlines, I was melting in awe of her truly amazing accomplishments - a contemporary of Amelia Earhart, participant in the first Powder Puff Derby, establisher of early women's endurance, night-flying and air-to-air refueling records, original member of 99s - and all I could

think was, 'Wow!' Doug then steered her towards a commemorative painting he had done, featuring her in 1929, establishing a new women's flying record in her own airplane. I could only stare in amazement as she autographed the painting to brilliant flashes from multiple cameras.


Life seems to come around full circle in ways we seldom expect, and I was incredibly blessed to experience one of those moments - plus more than I ever bargained for! I can add to my collection of fond memories a delightful breakfast with Doug and his wife Joy the next morning, and of having met Bobbi Trout, a truly remarkable pioneer aviator.


