

Aloha! By the time you get this newsletter we will be about 6 months away from the Hawaii convention. How is that possible? Didn't we just leave Boston? There was a lot of fun in Boston and there will be just as much fun with tropical breezes in Hawaii. So make plans now for the 2006 convention May 16-18, 2006 on the Big Island of Hawaii.

For anyone who hasn't been to an ISA convention there is a certain format that is basically followed every year. Arrive at your leisure (or not if non-reving doesn't go well). Monday will be the board meeting in the hospitality suite; everyone is welcome. Tuesday make your way into the hospitality suite to register and catch up with old friends and start making new ones. Tuesday evening will be the formal cocktail party. Dress is fancy. The children will be entertained at Camp Menchune. Wednesday morning will be the business meeting. Dress for this is uniforms with no hats or coats. (We're trying for as little polyester as possible in paradise). After the meeting will be the group photo and then lunch. After lunch there is a short break and then the busses will leave for downtown Kona for a little shopping and then a wonderful Hawaiian luau. Thursday is our 'fun day' and will be a full day tour of the Big Island.

To explain some of the not so basic aspects of the convention is the fun part. First off, we are staying at a 5 star resort, which is everything you would expect from a Hawaiian resort. I don't have enough superlatives to describe this place. Suzanne Skeeters Trebon has arranged with a premier resort to give us a great deal. From the entry of the hotel to the canal boat or tram that will take you to your room, the hotel is the Hilton Waikoloa Village and this place is stunning. It has 2 championship golf courses, tennis courts, pools to just hang out at and Dolphin Quest. (Yes, you can swim with the dolphins.) There is a full service European style spa and after you've gotten pampered and healthy you can go to one of the ten restaurants or nine bars. There will be a million things to do just at the resort let alone all the fun ISA stuff. Lots of the really cool extra stuff will require a reservation and extra money so check directly with Hilton. Their website is www.hiltonwaikoloavillage.com.

The hotel has a wonderful camp for kids: Camp Menehune. They are opening it for our group Tuesday evening.

Board of Director Reports

It is an age appropriate camp for the kids during the cocktail party. The canal boat has a camp landing where the kids can be dropped off for the evening. While you are dressing up for the cocktail party the kids can be getting casual for an evening of activities geared toward learning about Hawaii from a child's point of view.

Learning from past mistakes we now have a "Room Mom". Lynn Austin has graciously volunteered to woman this position. She will coordinate with members who need a roommate. (In addition to the convention she is also going to do Ski Days). If you want or need a roommate, email Lynn with your info at isaroomie@hotmail.com. She will need to know if you have a reservation or are looking for a room. Include your name, phone number, email address, length of stay and preferences: smoking vs. nonsmoking, number of people in the room, and any other preference you might have. I'm excited that we are getting this up and running. I think it will really help at all ISA functions. 'Thank you Lynn.'

The side trip will be a whole day tour of the big island of Hawaii. It will be a full day touring the Kona Coffee Factory, City of Refuge Hawaiian National Park, and lunch at Volcanoes Lodge Restaurant (on your own dime), Lava tube walk and possibly some other sights. As you can see it will be a full day. It's a great time to tour and catch up with friends. I hope you will be joining us for the optional side trip.

Now that I've discussed the cool, fun stuff, I have the job of going over the not so fun stuff. The first is price. Fun doesn't come cheap. The price for all the fun stuff at the convention will be \$220 if you make your reservation by April 1st. After April 1st the price goes up to \$250. Some people have asked why the additional charge. ISA has deadlines where we have to pay for services contracted. After the cutoff, ISA's costs go up. As many Power Ball tickets as I keep buying. I can't bankroll ISA and believe me ISA hasn't got the money to foot the bill either. So try and plan early. The side trip is \$70. We have some cushion with the tour operator so that price won't have to go up. But we do have to book the busses. Once we get to April 1st we will have contracted with our best guess on the number of busses needed. Once they are filled there will be no more availability to sign up for the side trip. So please, try to plan early. Once again, checks are the preferred method of payment because it saves ISA and you money.

The cut off for room reservations is April 15. We hope you'll make your room reservations before then because after April 15 the group rate will not be available. The group rate is \$170 per night

with two people to a room. The room is a Mountain View room. If you want to upgrade to a partial ocean view (\$205) or a full ocean view (\$235) room, you can purchase it extra based on availability. In all rooms, each additional person pays an extra \$45. Based on availability room rates will be extended from May 12 -21. There is an optional \$15 per day resort fee. The resort fee entitles you to 2 rounds at the putting course, 2 passes to the fitness club, 1 hour tennis court time and a \$25 credit for lagoon beach toys. The hotel is giving us a 72 hour cutoff on cancellations. If you find that you can't make it after planning to come you can cancel without penalties from the hotel. There are numerous ways you can make your reservation. You can call Hawaii Waikoloa directly 808.886.1234, you can call Hilton central reservation 800.HILTONS or go to www.hilton.com. When you make your reservation, reference the code ISW or International Society of Women Airline Pilots.

If you have one, and can find it, please bring your ISA nametags.

We would love for you to renew your membership early. (Remember pay early, pay by check). But for those of you who are not able to do that we will be taking renewals at the convention. We have revised the membership timetable so there won't be any post cards going out to the members who have not renewed until after the convention.

Due to having to pay in advance for the various activities, we are once again going to institute an ISA cancellation policy. If you make a reservation and cancel it by April 1 there will be a full refund. April 1 to May 5 you will get 50% of your deposit back. After May 5 there will be no refunds.

If you will notice on the registration form, there is a spot for member assistance. We have combined the donation categories of Furlough Fund and the International Assistance Fund. The way it had been set up in the past, if we had a member who needed assistance in one of the older categories but there was no money in that particular category, we wouldn't be able to help. This way it's easier to spread the help around. If you can offer assistance to fellow members, you can make a notation on the registration form. You can also offer buddy passes or room sharing. If a member is in need of assistance in order to be able to attend the annual business meeting, please contact Member Assistance




Gina LaBella was a great partner and roommate for the three weeks; we worked hard but also managed to have fun too.

EDUCATIONAL TIP, BY ALICIA KUBIDA

Have you ever signed in for your trip, only to realize you don't have your FAA License and Medical? Don't panic! If your operations room/crew lounge has internet access, it is now very simple to get a temporary replacement.

- Go to registry.faa.gov.
- At top of page, click on "PILOTS".
- Look for "Get copy of license" Click on "ONLINE"
- Create an account.
- Once logged on, click on "Request Temporary Authority to Exercise Certificate Privileges."
- Fill in the blanks. You can have the temp certificate sent to a fax or an email.

When you create your account, they will email you a password that you can then use to Logon.

I recommend you establish your account now, before you really need it!

Establishing the account can take up to 15 minutes, which could be the difference between an on time departure and a crew delay. (That's what happened to me.) The temp certificate includes your medical. It is valid for 60 days. Your chief pilot might never know!



As the evening wore on some members headed back to Denver - work called. Others stayed Wednesday for some "single track" biking over the rocks, roots and streams - no accidents.



This was the question I grappled for years until a friend sent me a volunteer's applications for the National Air and Space Museum (NASM) about 2 years ago. I filled it out and waited.... Finally, in spring 2004, the same friend told me they were conducting interviews and asked if I had been contacted. Since I hadn't, she said for me to just show up with your copy of the application since they were trying to staff 2 museums at the same time: downtown Washington D.C. and also at the new Stephen F. Hazy Center (UHC) at the Dulles Airport.

The interview process was simple. Mainly 2 things: can I speak and do I present a professional appearance? I was scheduled for the fall classes starting late September 2004.

Now, the fun began. Not only did I have to know about airplanes, but about space as well. I crawled out of bed and dragged myself down to the metro stop. While waiting for public transportation I studied the notes from the week before, thinking there might be some continuity, but there wasn't.

I did this from 8am to 3pm every Saturday except government holiday weekends. Each curator has his or her own little piece of information. Most of the curators believed in teaching us through a fire hose. Maybe I was overwhelmed, but it did seem that the space guys were the worst! Since I'd been through this routine a number of times before, I went upstairs and asked different docents if we really had to memorize all this stuff? Their answer: "Only if you want to, but all the curators are a phone call away. And the exam at the end is open book and open notes."

There was no exam at the end in mid December. Nobody wanted to make a test for us down-towners, because they were working so hard at staffing UHC that they were not prepared to deal with us down-towers. The UHC trainees did get a 100-question test, but they are eight times our size. We display 10% of the artifacts, whereas UHC displays 80%.

In January, I met my mentor. By the third day, I delivered part of a tour called 'air transportation'. He said I should try a full tour next time. Next time wasn't until late February due to sicknesses, weather problems, and lack of docents that give the 'highlights tour'. Finally in March, I was checked to do solo tours: 50% aviation and 50% space. I completely ignored the weirder parts of space and mainly stuck to manned flight and the 2 rovers on mars.

I enjoy the people I meet, and some of the exotic questions I'm asked. One question for instance, "Did NASA give drugs to the astronauts to help them sleep or to keep them awake when they were fatigued?" My response was that I doubted it, because they were all pilots (through Apollo) and they wanted to keep their flying privileges.

Anyway, the busy times for school trips (during the spring and summer seasons) are over. I've gotten pretty good at this docent thing! I'm still limited to the 'highlights tour' once a week every Tuesday morning. After my probationary period, (yes here too), I'll be asked to do a 'specialty tour'. Being a retired airline pilot, I'm sure I'll be over prepared.
