

Now I have watched as others have received their furlough notification and had to begin the job search adventure again. It has not been an easy path, as each one has had to reevaluate her commitment to this career. Is it worth hanging on for a possible recall? Do I want to go through probation again with a different airline? The paycheck may be better in another field. Is it worth trying to stay in aviation?

Even those who have not changed airlines have faced pay reductions, downgrades, relocation and even the tough choice of retiring early. The good news is that our members are beginning to find positions with Jet Blue, Frontier, Federal Express, Net Jets, SkyWest and more. At UAL, there are equipment bids again. The industry hasn't recovered from 9/11 yet, but maybe the steep descent is shallowing.

Back to the members: They remind me that it takes dedication and a special personality to succeed as a pilot not only the first time, but perseverance to succeed a second or third and sometimes a fourth time. Their stories inspire me. Their individual personalities entertain me. Their hard work amazes me. Their friendships are priceless. I am lucky that I found ISA and have gotten to know so many wonderful women pilots.

If you want a chance to get to know your fellow member better, consider an ISA board position. You may ask, 'What kind of crazy woman volunteers to serve on the ISA Board'. Of the 15 people who have served during my tenure, 6 are furloughees, 2 retirees and several others work for companies in bankruptcy. There is always a little friendly banter about if they will even have passes for the next meeting if they are without a job or time off during their probationary year to attend. Even with that, they find a way to make it happen.

Being on the board gives you a great excuse for attending Convention. Take a trip to Denver in January for the board meeting and if you have the time off, stay and enjoy ski days. The September meeting depends on the standing board's

needs. They have been a single day in and out event, have been held at a spa in Florida, and have been tied in with biking in Colorado.

Board review of education related policies and procedures continue throughout the winter months. The board understands volunteer time is precious and continues to streamline responsibilities wherever it can.

In light of this effort there are a few things that have changed over my tenure and we are now in the process of formalizing these changes.

First, we have long declined requests to use our membership base for research projects, studies, and interviews. We respect the privacy and time constraints of our members and do not want to place further burdens on their already busy lives. However, there are occasional studies to which the board would like to lend support and at their discretion, will pass the information on to our members.

For example, the National Institutes of Health and the Sister Study, which looks at environmental factors in sisters of cancer survivors, recently approached ISA. A notice was put in this newsletter and an article was posted on the website which provides the information on how to join the study if you so choose. We felt this was a worthy cause and one that would particularly apply to us. Join the study at your own discretion. We just wanted to get the information out.

Second, we very occasionally get job information and requests. Our website is not the primary source of that type of information. Therefore, the board felt it was best to pass on all job referrals to an entity that would get the information out to the women who need it in the quickest way possible. We will be working with the Pro-99s to formalize an agreement that provides links between our sites for this purpose.

Again, these policies and procedures are being put in place to maximize our membership's available information while minimizing our volunteers' time and responsibilities. We want to make these board positions easier to do and easier to fill.

Speaking of filling positions – I will be vacating the education position in May. It is a fun and worthwhile position (hopefully streamlined for maximum efficiency). The board is a great way to do that "one thing" for ISA. Think about it....

Fed EX scholarship winner goes to IRAQ

On September 1, 2003, Stacy Cetin and Cheryl Konter were awarded the B-727 Type Rating Scholarships sponsored by Federal Express. As their plans unfolded, the training was scheduled at the PanAm training facility in Minneapolis, MN. ISA member, Susan Bailey Schmidt, graciously offered her Minneapolis home to lodge both the scholarship winners during their training. Cheryl Konter accepted the offer and successfully completed her B-727 Type rating in January, 2004.

Stacy Cetin encountered an unexpected detour with the deployment of her National Guard unit to Iraq. She has been stationed in Iraq since January, 2004 with the 185th Aviation Brigade, made up of mostly National Guard units from 32 states. The 185th is based at Balad Air Base in central Iraq, commanded by Col. Bradley MacNealy. Captain Stacy Cetin is an aide to MacNealy.

During her deployment, a group of family and friends of deployed soldiers formed The Family Readiness Group in the USA. They have been gathering donations of backpacks and school supplies for the 185th Task Force to give to Iraqi schoolchildren. But, the shipping cost to transport the school supplies to Iraq was prohibitive.

Federal Express and another organization, Operation Iraqi Children, OIC, organized by actor, Gary Sinise and author, Lauren Hillenbrand and others, stepped in to help deliver the school supplies to Iraq. Fed Ex donated eargo space to OIC to transport the school kits to Kuwait. Col. MacNealy of the 185th Task Force realized that his pilots could help by providing unused space on their aircraft to transport the school supplies from Kuwait to Balad Air Base. Missions from Balad cover all areas of Iraq. Col. MacNealy ensured that any flight leaving Balad with any empty space was filled with school supplies to distribute to Iraqi schoolchildren. Captain Stacy Cetin is among the many pilots who have donated their time to make the project a success. Since October, 2004, she has coordinated the logistics of shipping over 100 pallets of supplies. All the deliveries to the schools are done by the soldiers on their own time, on a voluntary basis.



June Viviano, an MD-11 captain at Fed Ex, organizes monthly networking luncheons in Memphis, TN for members of the local aviation community to meet and exchange news and ideas. During several of these luncheons, June has collected donations of school supplies to send to Stacy in Iraq. Captain Stacy Cetin is scheduled to return to the USA from Iraq in March, 2005 and hopes to attend the Women in Aviation conference in Dallas, TX. Her B-727 Type Rating scholarship is on hold for her, awaiting her return to the States.

SEE YOU THERE

If you're like me, you're barely thinking about May. So start thinking now, because a good time is planned for all who attend the Boston ISA Convention in May. First things first, weather. It's near and dear to every pilot's heart. I can almost promise you any kind you like in May in Boston. When I went to tour the hotels last year, I wore short sleeves and it was beautiful sunshine. Ten days later I came through on a trip and thought I was going to freeze on a preflight walk around with a uniform jacket and coat on; so be prepared for anything. The only events scheduled for outside the hotel are the evening dinner cruise and the all day side trip. I can pretty well promise you very cool evenings in May in Massachusetts. The other outside event is a very casual day. I recommend layers so you are prepared for anything.



There are a number of ways to get to the hotel. The easiest, and most expensive ride is a taxi cab. Taxis are plentiful and should cost about \$25.00. But if you get caught in traffic, and Boston's got some amazing traffic tie-ups, the price can go up. The next way to get to the hotel is the Boston Hotel Shuttle. The price is \$10 to \$12 per person, depending on load. The shuttle does hit a lot of hotels and our hotel may not be the first stop. If this is the way you have chosen to come, ask at the airport information desk where to catch the shuttle. The least expensive way to get to the hotel is the subway, the MBTA, known to Bostonians as "the T". It is America's oldest underground transit system; luckly it doesn't look like it. Take a free bus shuttle to the transit stop. It's a blue and white bus with Subway on the sign on the front. I was told it's the #22 from terminal B and the #33 from all other terminals. Only the blue transit line serves the airport. Take it inbound to the city to the State Street stop. State Street is the closest stop to the hotel with an elevator, so you won't have to lug your bags up a congested set of steps. When you come out of the stop go "up" Washington (I was told that means against the traffic) to School Street. Turn right on School, and go "up" to the Omni, which is at the end of the street. If you choose to come this way as you cross the bridge for the inbound train to Boston, make sure you notice the large portraits of Nancy Love and Amelia Earhart that welcome the women pilots of today to the city of Boston. The Subway is \$1.50 per person, one way.

The hotel is The Omni Parker House, 60 School Street, Boston, Ma. To make your reservation call: (800) THE-OMNI or (617) 227-8600, make sure you tell them you are with the International Society of Women Airline Pilots. Once again there are two types of rooms. For \$159.00, you get a nice large deluxe room with two double beds or one king or queen-sized bed and work desk. For \$129.00 you get a cute tiny little European room with a double bed and work area. The rates will be offered three days prior to three days after the meeting dates subject to availability at the time of the reservation. The cut off date for reservations is Tuesday, April 26. But please, please, please make your hotel and convention registrations before that.

Events are fun and varied. It starts on Monday with a Board of Directors meeting starting at 1pm in the registration room. Come on down. It's always good to see what your organization is up to. General registration starts at 9:00 Tuesday morning, where we will also have a photographer for the new pictorial directory. Tuesday evening is the cocktail party for the adults and kid's party for the, you guessed it, kids. Adults should be in formal attire but kids can be very casual. Wednesday morning will be the business meeting, in uniform. There will be no guests or children allowed at the business meeting. After the meeting it will be the group photo followed by lunch. A free afternoon will end with a river dinner cruise. The Spirit of Boston, our ship for Wednesday evening dinner, recommends business casual attire. It doesn't make a big difference to ISA, just as long as you're there. Then Thursday is a tour of historical Cape Ann, with Salem and Gloucester and a tour of Boston and all its wonderful history. Wear very casual clothes; layers are recommended so you're prepared for any weather. We'll leave the hotel at 9 AM and return about 6 or 7. We hope to end in an area of wonderful restaurants to top off a great day with some more time for visiting. It seems we can never get enough visiting in.

Kids during the cocktail party will have a party of their own. They will have a baby-sitter and will be in a room very close to the cocktail party. They will have dinner provided and goodie bags for each child with stuff to keep them entertained for the evening and even back in their hotel room later. Best of all parents can enjoy the party, knowing their kids are nearby.

Boston has so much to offer, I can't even begin to cover it all. It has excellent culinary hotspots and an abundance of attractions and sights, historical buildings, parks and cemeteries that are national landmarks. The city's architectural treasures include lovely brownstones, cobblestone streets and gas lamps in many neighborhoods. Boston streets are not easy to navigate in a car. They are believed to follow cow paths trodden in the 17th century. Fortunately, Boston may be the most walkable city in the US. We are in the heart of it all and we can follow those same paths on foot, kind-of like the cows, and see all the wonderful sights. The Freedom Trail is right across the street from our hotel for walking the city or walk to Boston Common, or Faneuil Hall or Quincy Market. The International Society of Women Airline Pilots Supports the Sister Study

We've all been touched by breast cancer. Whether we've personally experienced the disease or have a relative, friend or co-worker who's dealt with the challenge head on – breast cancer can be devastating. In the midst of the uncertainty, it's reassuring to know there's hope on the horizon. In an effort to find the causes of breast cancer, the **Sister Study** is seeking the help of the International Society of Women Airline Pilots.

The Sister Study is a nationwide research study, conducted by the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences, to learn how our environment and genes affect our chances of getting breast cancer. The study needs 50,000 women whose sister had breast cancer to help find the causes of the disease. Sisters of women with breast cancer have about twice the risk of developing breast cancer themselves — but why? The Sister Study research team is working hard to find the answer.

Is breast cancer caused by something women come in contact with at work, at home, in their communities or in the personal products they use? That's what the Sister Study is trying to answer and working women, in organizations, such as the International Society of Women Airline Pilots can play an important role in this landmark breast cancer study.

Women between ages 35 and 74 are eligible if their sister had breast cancer, but they have never had breast cancer themselves.

The Sister Study has made participation as convenient as possible to ensure women feel comfortable, and it doesn't interfere with their work schedules. "At the beginning, women will answer some overthe-phone and written surveys and provide blood, urine, household dust and toenail samples," said Dr. Dale Sandler, principal investigator of the Sister Study. "After that for about 10 years, we'll touch base once a year to learn about changes to their address, health or environment." She added, "The Sister Study does not require participants to take any medicine, undergo any medical treatments, or make any changes to their habits, diet or daily life."

The Sister Study empowers sisters to help fight breast cancer now so that future generations of daughters, granddaughters and nieces may not have to face the disease.

How can a member of the International Society of Women Airline Pilots help? You can join the Sister Study or simply spread the word to other women about the study. Three Things Every Recruiter Looks for in a Resume

If you are in the middle of a job search, recruiters can be either your friends or your foe. They make the choice to keep you out of the hiring process or to introduce you to corporate hiring decision makers. The quality of your resume is a key factor in determining how recruiters will treat you in the job market.

There are three things every recruiter looks for in a resume:

- 1. Focus
- 2. Core competencies or transferable skills
- 3. Accomplishments

If your resume lacks any of these crucial elements, then you are probably not capturing the attention you deserve, and you are missing out on important interview opportunities.

1. Focus

Since recruiters' time is at a premium, they must know your career focus within seconds of opening your resume. If your career focus isn't clearly stated, you can't assume the reader will take the time to search through your resume for clues. Most recruiters consider Career Objectives Statements worthless if they contain no real information about the specific position you are looking for and the industry expertise you offer. The best objective statements are concise and to the point.

2. Core competencies or transferable skills

Once a recruiter understands your focus, he/she will want to know if you have the required core competencies or transferable skills to accomplish the job. A thorough research of employer job descriptions will help you identify the core competencies your resume must feature.

You'll capture and hold recruiter attention by including only those core competencies relating specifically to your focus. Be careful not to muddy up your personal marketing message by including extraneous skills. If you remember the all important rule of relevancy, you'll go a long way toward keeping the reader's attention on your key skills.

3. Accomplishments

Once your resume has made it through the initial screening for focus and skills, the recruiter will want to know how you stack up against other candidates. Remember, with record-high resume response to job openings, recruiters need good, solid reasons to recommend you for consideration over the mountain of other candidates. Clear and concisely stated accomplishments are the best way to distinguish yourself from your competition.

Whether the recruiter works for one corporation or represents many corporate clients as a third-party recruiting consultant, he or she must be able to give valid reasons for promoting you as a viable candidate. You can make their job infinitely easier by including the information they need and bring your resume to the top of the candidate pile. When your resume sells itself, you gain advantage points, and make the recruiter look good as well.

For optimum impact, write accomplishments that illustrate the strength of your core competencies, transferable skills and focus. An accomplishment is only valuable to your resume if it promotes the skills your target employers are looking for. Remember the rule of relevancy as you craft each of your accomplishment statements.

In today's extremely competitive job market, employers rely heavily on recruiters to screen out the crowd of applicants. Allow them to present you as one of their best candidates by letting your resume present your best abilities.

ISA Member Captain Connie J. Tobias Honored on the 101st Anniversary of Powered Flight




Captain Connie J. Tobias was honored by the Aviation Trail Inc. at the 101st Anniversary of Powered Flight Celebration at the National Museum of the United States Air Force, Dayton, Ohio on December 17, 2004. Connie was awarded a Certificate of Recognition from the National Aeronautic Association (NAA) of the Federation Aeronautique Internationale. The recognition was for "her generous support to the American aviation community by re-enacting the past and teaching future aviators the humble beginnings of flight".

The award was presented to Connie by E. Blair Conrad, Director of Aviation, Dayton International Airport and the 2004 Aviation Trial Blazer of the year recipient.

Connie was also recognized for her pioneering flight in the original replica of the 1903 Wright Flyer in Dayton, Ohio on January 7, 2004. Connie is the first woman to successfully fly the 1903 Wright Flyer replica.

Connie was not only the honoree, but also the keynote speaker for the celebration. Connie gave a stirring presentation on "Putting Wings on Dreams" and the importance preserving the legacy and heritage of the Wright Brothers and the development of practical flight in Dayton, Ohio. Connie's perspective was from her fulfillment of her dreams and her efforts to give something back by educating and motivating others about the preservation of aviation heritage. Connie's presentation was in the form of "story telling" which had the audience's full attention as she walked among the seated guests as she spoke. Her performance was met with a standing ovation and accolades that included "Nothing short of brilliant.." by aviation author Ann Cooper and "Mesmerizing" by Cee John of the National Aviation Hall of Fame. Zoe Dell Nutter, pioneer woman in aviation, philanthropist and National Aviation Hall of Fame Founder commented of Connie," a real aviator and a real woman".



The Aviation Trail Celebration of the 101st Anniversary of Powered Flight and Wright Family Christmas Dinner was held in the museum's Modern Flight Gallery Hangar highlighted by the red glow of cockpit lighting of the many exotic and historic aircraft surrounding the guest seating area. Prior to Connie's presentation, the entire United States Air Force Band of Flight with their version of "White Christmas" entertained the guests. During the evening, the National Aviation Hall of Fame Board of Trustees announced the enshrined class of 2005, which includes two women aviators. Notable attendees of the 250 aviation enthusiasts at the dinner gala included Wright family members: Marion Wright, Stephen Wright and Amanda Wright Lane, the grand nephew and niece of the Wright Brothers, and the Commander Air Force Material Command, WPAFB General Gregory S. Martin USAF.

Connie continues her involvement with Wright Brothers Aeroplane Company of Dayton, Ohio in an effort to preserve the Wright Brothers legacy in the development of practical flight. Connie is working with the Wright Brothers Aeroplane Company as the final assembly takes place on the 1905 Wright Flyer III she will fly this spring.

Connie was also recognized for continuing historical re-enactments of the pioneer aviator Harriet Quimby at museums, air shows, schools, universities and corporate venues to educate young people and motivate adults to follow their dreams and achieve excellence. Connie uses these opportunities to create interest in the Harriet Quimby Scholarship she established at the Ohio University in 2001. More than a dozen scholarships have been awarded over the past three years to dedicated young people following their dreams in aviation.


Marriage

The North American Airlines Ski Federation (NAASF) will commence its 27'Th season this year. NAASF was founded in 1977 as a nonprofit organization to promote skiing and ski racing among all airline employees. Over 20 airlines are represented each year. NAASF skiers converge on a different ski area for one week each month, from January through April, with 500 and as many as 1,300 airline employees, spouses and guests at each ski week. Despite the woe of our ailing airline industry attendance remains stable and has recently enjoyed in attendance over several hundred skiers. New airline ski clubs and teams are forming and the long-standing major airline ski clubs' memberships with NAASF remain stable.

North American ski resorts bid eighteen months in advance to host a NAASF Ski Week.

In 2005, NAASF will visit Telluride, Co, Steamboat, Co, and Sun Valley, Id. In 2006, NAASF will visit Jackson Hole, Wy, North Star, Ca and Snowmass, Co.

In addition in 2005, many NAASF members will attend the 2005 TASF ski week above the artic circle in Levi, Finland like many did at Mt. Alyeska, Alaska, U.S.A. last March (2004). You should think about attending the IASF ski week in Schladming, Austria the following year (2006); so come out to your airline ski club now so you can be part of NAASF. Airline ski teams/clubs, as well as individuals, are awarded points for certified slalom and giant slalom races. Each airline enters teams which will compete in advanced 'A' races, basic 'B' races, and Snowboard 'S/B' races. The "A" races are similar to those run by FIS or USSA Master's level racers. The "B" races are held on a separate hill, a little less

challenging and more like a USSA Junior's Race. There is a master's age category at the "A" and "B" levels. Also, there is a newcomer's race for those who would like to "run the gates" but are new to skiing. If you're a newcomer, don't be shy, come out to recreation ski or try your hand at ski racing; The NAASF Webmaster did four years ago. You can find the love your looking for through skiing and at the same time meet a dedicated group of great airline people who love to ski, converse, party and laugh. Say goodbye to doom and gloom forever. You will feel alive- so let's party. It's for certain you'll make a new friend and any dollars that you spend at our ski parties go toward sponsoring a young adult skier (check out the NAASF Foundation page). At the very least, the people of NAASF will forever alter your life's path. So, follow your heart and take a chance with me. It's not all about wealth and riches; you will certainly laugh a lot, either in conversation or observation; For example, the great theme night costume parties are a great source of entertainment. Hence, these conversations often lead to other great adventures with others in our federation, such as trips to the Mexico, Greece or Hawaii. Snowboard races at each week also count toward the final team points. Trophies are awarded weekly, with cumulative points deciding the overall champions and best teams, who are all announced at the final Ski Week. Some folks do not even race. They just come to cheer on their teammates and enjoy the mountain sports most people just dream about. Employees from all facets of the airline industry are represented. It is a natural setting, relaxed climate for friendly competition and grand camaraderie. Ski week formats include the racing, welcome parties, picnics on the hill, après-ski gatherings, F*U*N races and sponsored events. The evening events are often "theme" oriented parties. It is easy to see that NAASF Ski Weeks have popularized skiing among airline personnel. The growth in numbers of participants over the years has been overwhelming, exceeding expectations.

Along with our own fun, there has been a growing concern and awareness for the needs of U.S. ski racing programs, with promotion of ski racing in mind, the NAASF Foundation was formed to award scholarships and grants to promising young ski racers, all based on financial need, age and racing level. This money is generated from guest fees, silent auctions, raffles of equipment, and ski week packages for two, etc., all generously donated from our wonderful sponsors, host resorts and town shops, at each event. This has been a very rewarding venture on behalf of NAASF and its skiers, as a means to return a little back to the sport we enjoy. Our foundation was able to raise \$11,000 for the last season in financial assistance. It was a great help to these aspiring young racers
