

ISA+21 SCHOLARSHIP TIPS

We have combined a few helpful tips for applying for ISA+21 Scholarships or any other aviation scholarships. We believe that not only it will assist everyone with the application process, it might make your application more successful.

1. Tell the truth:

- Do not get creative with the truth, do not stretch the truth
- No exaggerations

2. Follow the directions and pay attention to details:

- Do the requirements ask for two one-page letters of recommendations? If so, send two letters. No more, no less
- Does the scholarship require a transcript from your schools? Does it need to be certified?
- Does the essay need to be 500 words or less? There are dozens and dozens of applications and yours could be disqualified if your essay does not meet the requirements
- Send clear copies of pilot certificates, ratings, logbook pages and any other required materials
- Use the official application form and fill it out completely
- Make sure you are qualified for the scholarship you are applying for

3. Spend time on your essay and tell your unique story, what makes you YOU:

- Be passionate and show the scholarship selection committee who you are and why you are the best candidate for the scholarship
- Do not submit a generic, "canned", "one-size-fits-all" essay
- Help the scholarship selection committee get to know real YOU and help them feel your passion and enthusiasm
- Include your financial need statement in your essay
- If you have some sort of financial hardship, say so
- No whining





4. Additional essay tips:

- Make sure to abide by a word limit (in most cases it is 500 words or less)
- Get "really", "very" and "like" out of your vocabulary
- Try not to use passive voice
- Do not use abbreviations or contractions
- Stay on target
- Proofread, proofread (have someone else read it as well)

5. Letters of recommendations:

- Ask for letters of recommendations early
- Prepare a few items including a copy of your application, a resume and a deadline for your chosen writer to aid him/her in writing your best letter of recommendation
- Make sure that one of the letters of recommendation is from a pilot who has flown with you
- No family letters

6. Complete the application process in full:

- Answer all the questions- do not leave anything blank
- Provide all the requested information and supporting documents.
- Include all the required materials and documents in one package/one email
- Do not leave anything out. Do not add extra items

7. Do not miss the deadline:

- Send your application early
- If submitting a paper application package through WAI, the submission MUST be postmarked on or before the deadline listed on WAI website (www.wai.org)

8. Do not send anything extra:

- The scholarship committee works hard to give each application equal weight and equal attention. They do not need additional items
- Do not include videos, photos or anything else that is not requested



9. Start EARLY:

- It takes time for people to write meaningful letters of recommendation and get them back to you. Allow your chosen writer enough time to complete the letter
- It takes time for college transcripts to be processed and sent to you. Do not wait until the last minute to make the request for your official transcripts
- It will take time to gather certificates and to make copies
- It should take time for you to write a winning essay

10. Neatness counts:

- How you prepare your application speaks loudly about how detailoriented you are
- If you are submitting a paper application package, make sure to have the application typed. Do not handwrite anything except your signature. Use good paper and keep it tidy
- For the logbook copies, make sure it is easy to read your flight times
- Be sure that at the end of each logbook page, your total time from previous page has been included
- Make the aircraft types that you fly clear on your logbook pages
- Make sure each logbook page is signed, which verifies correctness of those entries

11. Currency:

- Be sure your medical is current and appropriate for that next rating you desire
- Make sure a legible copy of your most current pilot certificate is included
- Include the copies of appropriate written exams with a passing grade

12. Proofread your submission and keep a full copy for yourself:

- Ask someone to review the requirements and be sure your application is complete
- Ask someone to read your essay
- Check for typos, errors and proper grammar





13. If you do not get a scholarship the first time:

- KEEP TRYING!
- Keep tweaking your application/essay and improve your chances of winning an aviation scholarship by making yourself stand out (volunteer, make a difference in your community, brush up your essay skills, improve your leadership skills, maintain professional online appearance)
